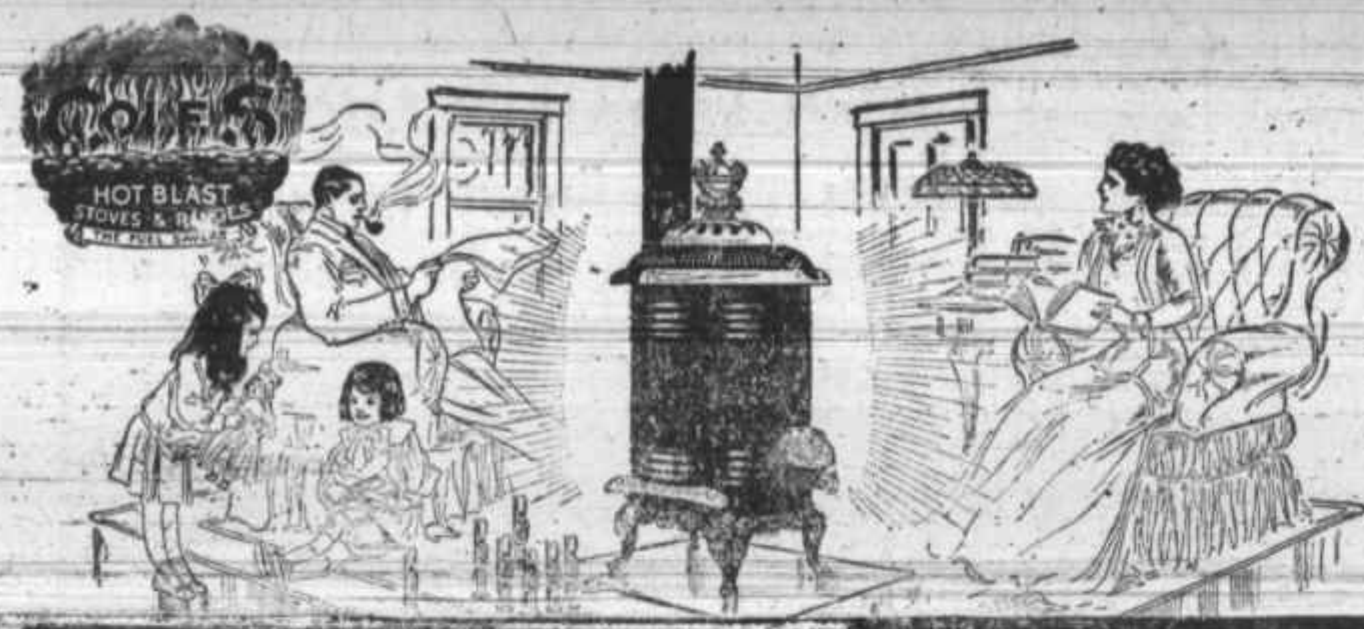

The above are minimum values based on Texas and Louisiana types. For each pound over standard weight 5 cents per pound is added, and for each pound less than standard weight 5 cents per pound is deducted. All rice is sold on intrinsic milling values. Proport allowance, is made for defective grades, likewise for exceptionally flinty, white, and fancy grades.

Coffin Promised Each Negro.

A few days ago, a strange man told some negroes in Mt. Pleasant that he had been sent out by the government to deliver to each negro a coffin, and that he would deliver it soon, leaving one at each house as he visited for each member of the family, and would give the negroes twelve months in which to pay for them. He said he would come around

once each month and collect a monthly installment on each coffin.

Several negro families have been considerably excited over the matter. In the first place, they do not care to have a lot of coffins piled up in their houses, and in the second place, they do not care to be bound up to meet the regular monthly payments.

One negro interviewed stated that the man said he would be in Mount Pleasant today or tomorrow, but would make all deliveries in the night time. For this reason, the negro who told Times Review of the strange visitor, and his strange proposal, said that he and his family intended to sleep in the woods on the night the coffin distributor is expected. This negro has ten or eleven children and he considers that if a coffin is left for each child as well as himself and wife, he will be pretty well stockaded up in the undertaking line, and that the total monthly payments he will have to meet will consume about all he can make. It was suggested to him that he might dispose of the lot to one of the local undertaking establishments, but he said: "Lardy, man, don't you know they'd put the finger in my eye, if I sell dem coffins 'fore I gets 'em paid for? No sir, man, I don't try sell um. Guess I'll have to work an' pay dat white man for um."—Mount Pleasant Times Review.
