Couldn't Phase Him.

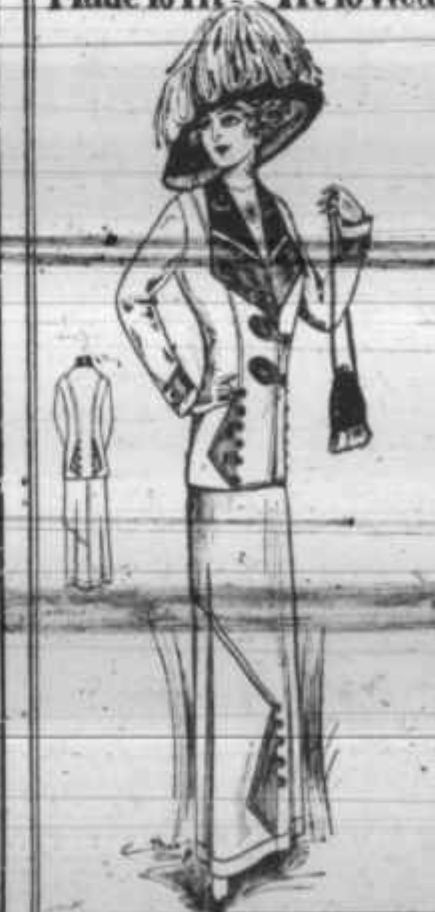
