EXHIBIT FOR DALLAS FAIR

The car loaded with the Colorado county exhibit for the Dallas Fair was shipped to that city Tuesday. Mr. M. C. Yates, who has worked faithfully and hard in collecting up the exhibit, left Wednesday night for Dallas and will be in charge of the Colorado county booth during the fair. The booth at the fair grounds is No. 61. The exhibit consisted of 20 grades of rice—16 clean and 4 rough; 3 grades of sugar; ribbon cane, seeded ribbon cane, sorghum, long stock milo-maze, short stock milo-maze, water-melons, 3 kinds of Irish potatoes, vinegar, 5 grades of wine, 2 grades of cigars, sweet potatoes, Japanese persimmons, peas, six cases of preserved figs, peaches and apples; jellies, cotton, corn, pecans, alfalfa hay, prairie grass hay, millet hay, concho grass hay, peas, dishrag gourd, citron, pineapples, okra, butter beans, snap beans, brooms, broom-corn straw, Japanese wheat, giant beans, millet heads, peppers, beet-pickles, peanuts and other articles.

After the State Fair at Dallas closes, the exhibit will be taken to San Antonio for the International Fair. This display, which will show to the visitors at the fairs some of the many and excellent products that are raised in Colorado county, will do much toward advertising old Colorado—the best county in Texas.
