OUR EXHIBIT AT THE FAIR

Mr. R. E. Walker returned

home Wednesday from a visit to

the Dallas Fair. When asked by

the HEADLIGHT about the Colo-

rado county exhibit, Mr. Walker

said: "Colorado county's booth

is No. 61, which is not the most

desirable location from a public-

ity view point, but Mr. Yates has

done exceedingly well with the

limited means that was placed

at his command. The display is

certainly a credit to Messrs.

Yates and Strickland, as they

are practically the only ones who

put any time and attention to the

matter of getting up a display,

and although it shows a great

many resources for old Colorado

county, it does not reflect any

credit on the citizens of the coun-

ty. I found, upon actual investi-

gation, that the average cost of

the county or town exhibit was

about \$250 for the initial cost of

the exhibits before starting away

from home with them. Our ex-

hibit was gotten up and shipped

to Dallas, all expenses paid and

Mr. Yates' railroad fare included,

out of the \$100 raised by sub-

scription, and the balance has

been paid for decoration of the

booth and the necessary expenses.

While Colorado County sent one

man with her exhibit to Dallas

and expected him to make a

showing with sixty-one other

counties that sent from two to

four men and spent as much as

\$5,000 for their exhibit alone.

Cook and Hopkins counties spent

this amount in getting their ex-

hibit up, and the Commercial

Club of Gainesville pays their man

\$1800 a year just to look after

their exhibit. Now for a compar-

ison. The principle entries in all

the exhibits are wheat, corn, rice,

oats, kafir corn, grasses, fruits

and vegetables. Colorado coun-

ty is right in line with every-

thing but the wheat. She has

twenty-four entries for prizes

and Mr. Yates says he stands a

fine chance on at least the rice,

sugar cane, fig preserves and

brooms. Colorado county has
more staple exhibits than one
half of the counties represented,
and even at that a great many of
our vegetables were pulled green
and moulded before they reached
Dallas so that it was impossible
to show them. Jefferson and
Matagorda counties wired back
after their rice exhibits when
they found what they would have
to go up against, and the Comet
rice people or the Seaboard Rice
Milling Co., of Galveston, refused
to enter any rice in the contest,
stating that they were acquaint-
ed with the mills and millers at
Eagle Lake and knew that it was
impossible to beat perfect rice.
Matagorda county will not com-
pete on any other product but
rice, and Matagorda, with Jeffers-
on, will be our hardest competi-
tors. Now if Colorado county can
do so well on such a small basis,
why can't the citizens wake up
and put a little time to the mat-
ter and get an exhibit that will
be a credit to the best county in
the State. Every man in the
county would be benefited by
the advertisement that a good
exhibit would bring. It is too
late of course to help this exhibit
at Dallas now, but it can do equal-
ly as much good in San Antonio
and it will cost nothing to get it
there. And there will be other
fairs and more chances to show
what this county can produce.

DEATH OF CHAS. HODLEY

Mr. Chas. Hodley died at his
home about three miles from
Eagle Lake at early hour Wed-
nesday after an illness of two
weeks, at the age of seventy-one
years. The funeral services were
conducted at the family residence
at one o'clock Wednesday after-
noon, Rev. George Cansey officiat-
ing, interment being made in
the Lakeside cemetery.

Charles Lambert Hodley was
born in Rushville, Indiana, July
8, 1840. At the age of twenty-
three he answered his country's
call and served nearly three years
in company I, 4th Illinois Cal-
vary, in the war between the
States. He was mustered out at
Houston, Texas, May 29, 1866.
Mr. Hodley was married on De-
cember 22, 1869, at Ottawa, Ill.

This union five children were
born, two of whom have preceded
him in death. He is survived by
his wife, two daughters, Mrs.
Oliver Reese of Sereus, Ill. and
Mrs. P. S. Kellison, and a son,
Edward T. Hodley, the latter
two of this city. Mr. Hodley
lived in the Northern States un-
til fifteen years ago when he came
to Texas and settled about three
miles from Eagle Lake where he
has resided ever since. The pall
bearers were: Rex Stephens, G.
E. Thomas, W. T. Chester, Ben
McCormick, Fred McCormick
and Chas. Banning.

Mr. Hodley was a good man.
He was always pleasant and jo-
vat and everyone that knew him
liked him. During his fifteen
years' residence among us we
have never heard one word ill
spoken of him. The HEADLIGHT

the family in their bereavement.

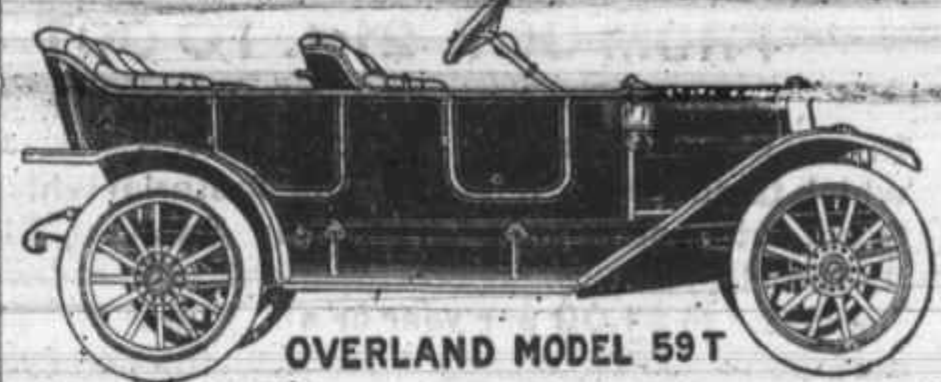
