Mrs. John Brock and children of Garwood are visiting in Chesterville.

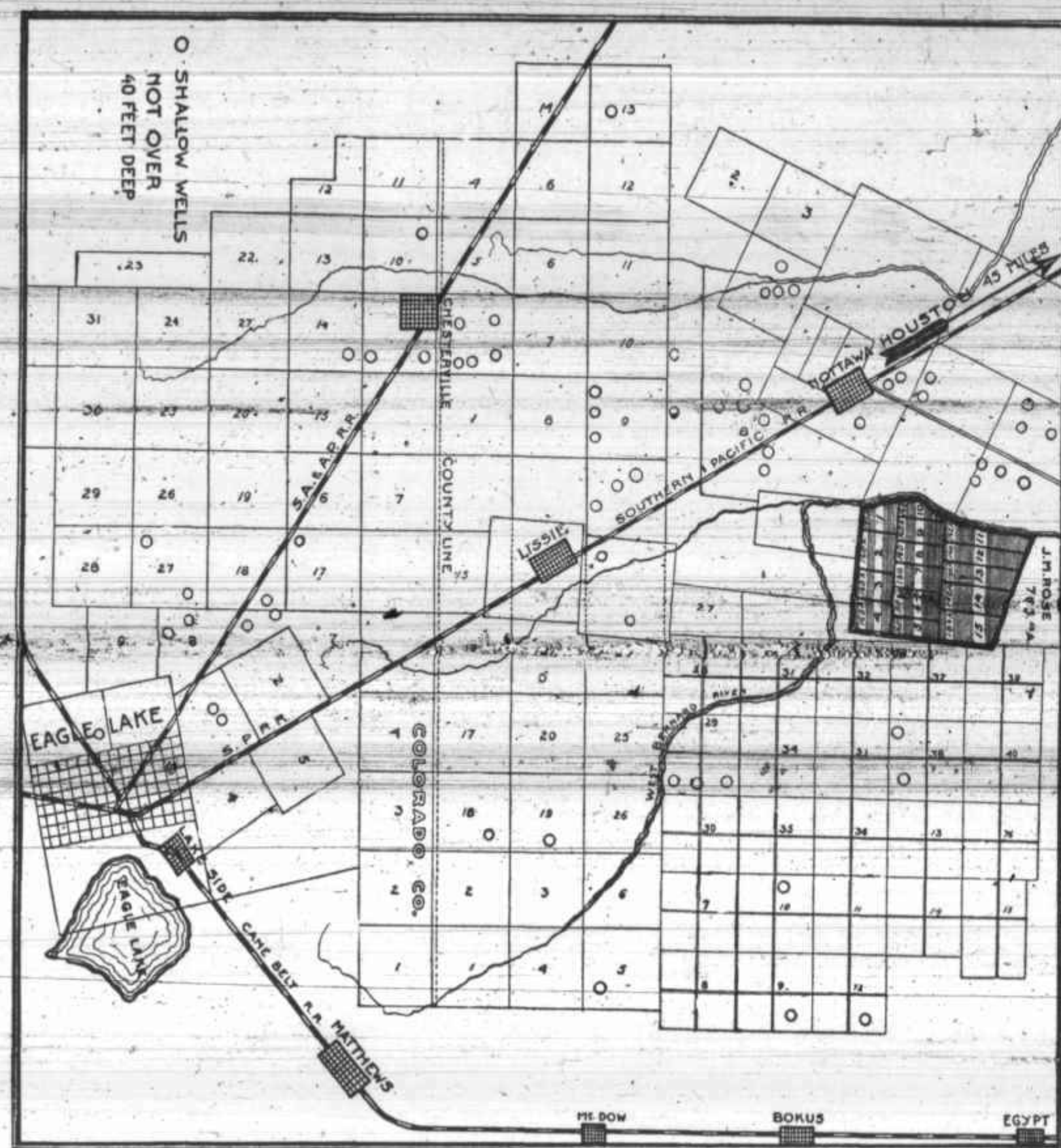
Penn Brown who has been working for Mr. J. E. Davidson, has accepted a position in Eagle Lake.

COLORADO COUNTY EXHIBIT TAKES PRIZES AT THE DALLAS STATE FAIR

The Colorado County exhibit at the Dallas Fair, while not as large and elaborate as it should have been, has attracted much attention and has captured a number of prizes.

Colorado County gets first and second prizes on sugar, with several competitive entries. We also took first prize on wine, more than three hundred bottles being entered. Our exhibit contained fourteen bottles of wine made at Mentz. Colorado County received the gold medal on the rice display, and two first and two second prizes on rice, against the Seaboard Rice Mill.

Colorado County also took second prize on Rock Island brooms, second prize on Engelhard Bros. Johnson grass hay, first prize on Irish potatoes, a bushel of Briscoe & Terrell's and a few of Dr. P. T. Gordon's potatoes capturing the prize. Colorado County's potatoes defeated more than ten counties, while several more counties withdrew their potato exhibits.

Mr. M. C. Yates, who is in charge of the exhibit at the fair, says that not one half of the people who have viewed the exhibit know where Colorado County is located. He says our exhibit at the fair is going to aid every nook and corner of the county.

Mr. Yates says, however, that the fair is discriminating against South Texas and the rice and cane belts. For the fifteen hundred pounds of rice and rice products he carried to Dallas for the Eagle Lake Rice Mill, and the three hundred dollar display

of rice products, and sixty bundles of rice in sheaths, only a measly two dollar prize is offered. The same prize is offered for one of the world's great products, sugar, while milo-maize, ten heads worth approximately ten cents, brings the exhibitor ten dollars.

Mr. Yates will load up the exhibit and get same out of Dallas Monday morning for the San Antonio Fair. He will arrive in Eagle Lake from Dallas Monday or Tuesday and will make an effort to strengthen the exhibit before setting same up at the San Antonio Fair.

With Eagle Lake, Columbus and Weimar, we are anxious to make this county's exhibit attractive, assisted by the smaller towns of the county, old Colorado could afford an exhibit that would make visitors to the fair sit up and take notice. Our citizens are giving this important matter entirely too little attention. They should interest themselves in this manner of advertising, for old Colorado County is far ahead of most of the counties in Texas in point of products and our resources should be properly displayed at the fairs and at least two men should accompany the exhibits.
