

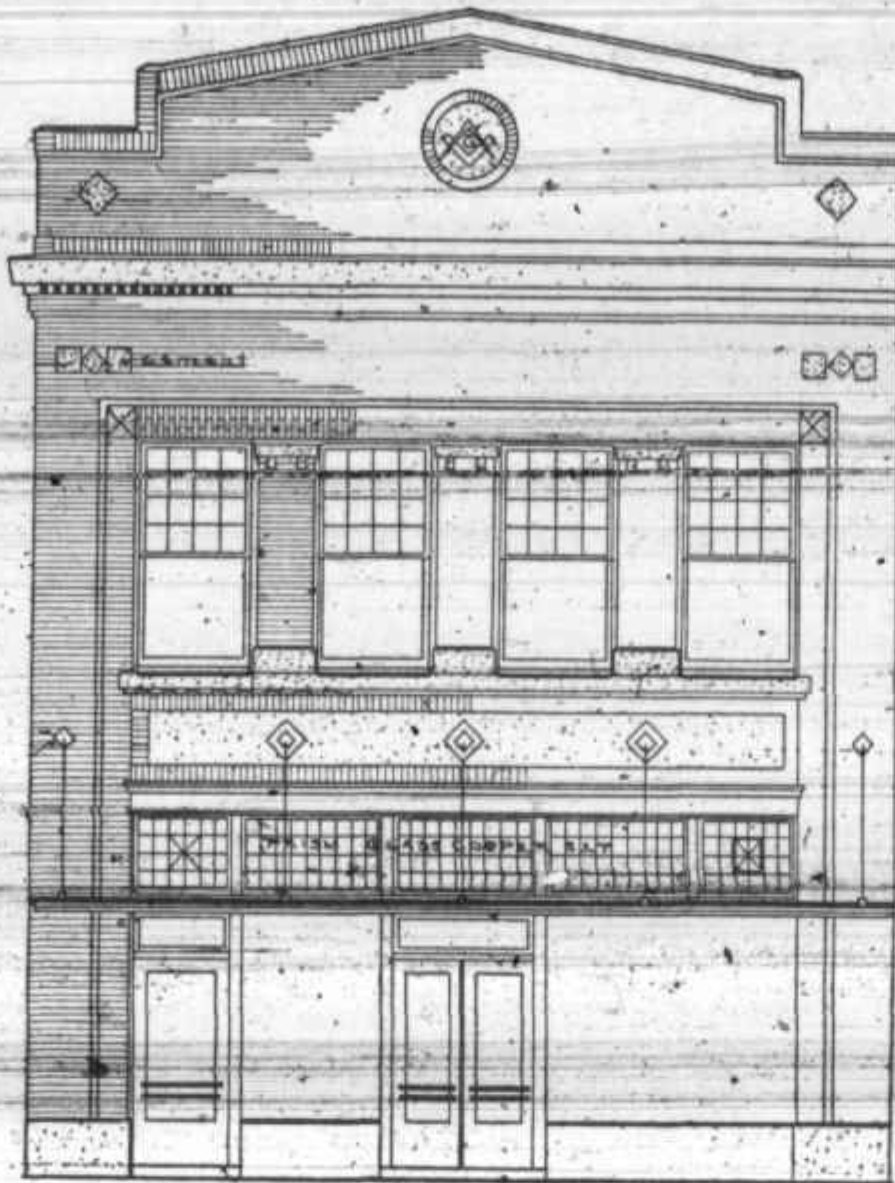

The club was organized because through organization is the proper way to build up a town. The time has come when we should not sit idly by and see other towns building and prospering when with a little united effort we can outdo them—because we have in old Colorado county the most productive county in Texas. We've got the climate, we've got the soil—and all we need to make things hum here is "boosting," and we are going to have that.

Another meeting will be held at the opera house next Thursday night and every citizen of the town who believes in the up-building and progress of his community should be present.

One pleasing feature of last night's meeting was that there were a number of the farmers from the country present and they were enthusiastic in the effort to further the interests of this section. If the farmers from the country are interested enough to come in to attend these meetings, then the progressive citizens of the town should certainly attend. Come out next Thursday night and see what goes on at the meeting. Come and see for yourself and then ask yourself the question if the organization isn't a good thing to assist in pushing along.

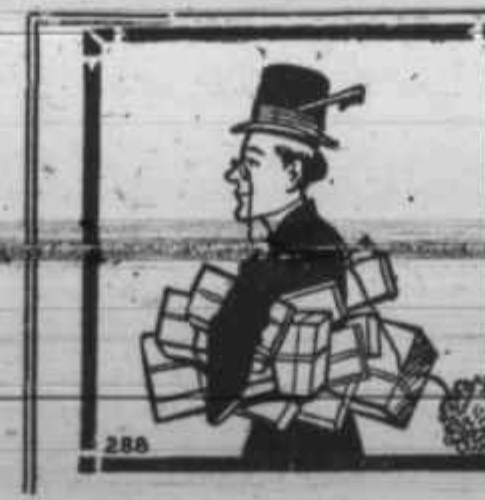
A NOTE TO YOU

FARMERS ARE PROSPEROUS

GARWOOD LUMBER DEAL

Mr. A. C. McClanahan has been spending the week in Garwood, a deal being consummated there, this week wherein the large lumber yards of the McClanahan-Field Mercantile Company and the Ed. R. Frnka Lumber Company are consolidated into one business under the firm name of the McClanahan-Frnka Lumber Company. The new concern is incorporated for \$20,000, with A. C. McClanahan, president; Ed. R. Frnka, vice-president and general manager; Frank Kalina, secretary; and J. Bouska, treasurer.

In the consolidation deal, Mr. B. F. Field disposes of his interest in the lumber business to A. C. McClanahan and Ed. R. Frnka, and in turn Mr. McClanahan purchases a half interest in the lumber and general hardware business of Mr. Frnka. The combining of these two large lumber and hardware concerns gives the little city of Garwood a lumber company the equal of which can possibly not be found in Texas in a town of the same size. All the lumber at the former McClanahan-Field shed is being moved to the Frnka sheds, which will be used strictly as a lumber shed for the new firm and the McClanahan-Field sheds will be used for wagons, implements and builders' hardware by the new firm.
