COLD WAVE RUINS CANE

A cold wave struck this community Monday, and Tuesday night the thermometer registered 24 degrees. On Wednesday night the thermometer went even lower, reaching 18 degrees, which is the coldest record for November for many years, in fact many of the older citizens have told us that they have never seen such a cold spell in November in this section of the country before. The cold spell has ruined the cane crop, causing a loss to the planters of thousands of dollars. The Lakeside Sugar Refining Company alone having something like 2000 acres of cane standing in the fields. Other planters who have cane in the fields are John Matthews & Co., Hood & Martin, Menor Northington, C. M. Wacker, Duncan Bros., R. S. Simmons, J. H. Dorman and Sorrel Bros. Dr. P. T. Gordon also has a small acreage and the Faber Mercantile Company a small acreage. The last named firm having saved practically its whole crop by windrowing. The Lakeside Sugar Refining Company's plant will likely be able to run twenty or twenty-five days longer before the cane gets too sour for use. This will, of course, depend entirely upon the weather, the cooler the weather remains now the better it will be for the cane men. The sugar cane men will use all the labor possible to rush their cane to the mill before it is too late.

The last early freeze in this country to kill the cane crop was on December 14, 1901, at which time the thermometer also went to 18 degrees, this freeze catch-

ing Capt. Denovant with 3000 acres of cane standing in the field.
