Eating Horse Flesh.

It comes as a surprise to most of us to learn that horse flesh is a popular article of diet in our own country. We have heard for some time that Europeans, who are rather short on beef, and not very particular as to what kind of meat they eat, consume much equine flesh, but few of us ever dreamed that we were eating horse meat at home.

To be frank, we see no reason why horse flesh should not make popular steaks, roast and hash, but in this country we haven't formed the horse-eating habit. The horse is as clean in his habits as the ox, eats the same kind of food, and is even more particular in selecting his drinks; compared to the hog he is as the dove to the turkey buzzard. But our forefathers didn't eat horse flesh and we don't want to eat it. But recent investigations show

that we are eating it. The National Board of Health and the New Jersey Board of Health recently conducted an investigation which showed that much horse flesh is shipped from our eastern cities to Europe. The shipments include not only horses that are killed to relieve them of suffering, but horses that die natural deaths also. If Europe wants this kind of meat for home consumption there is scarcely room to protest on this side of the Atlantic; but here is where our kick comes: The Europeans convert the horse meat into fancy brand sausages, send it back to America and sell it at advanced prices.

A latter day axiom runs about like this: "What people don't know doesn't worry them." We might have gone on eating over-ripe horse flesh for generations if the Boards of Health hadn't

conducted their investigations, but since the publication of the nauseating details we ought at least favor our stomachs to the extent of seeing that they are not defiled with foreign sausages. —Honey Grove Signal.

WAS A COLD NOVEMBER

The weather has been very cold here this week, and this has been the coldest November in a good many years. The recent heavy frosts and slight freezes have nipped the potato tops and that crop, so some of the potato men tell us, is practically through making and that the early cold weather has cut the crop extremely short. Potato digging will begin on the large potato plantations probably the second week in December. The weather men have predicted a very severe winter and early indications are that their predictions will come true.

On this trip Mr. Wooten sold a carload of long staple seed at East Bernard, a car at El Campo, one at Wharton and one at Bay City.

MAIN LINE FOR GARWOOD

County Commissioner W. S. Griffiths while here in attendance upon court last week, stated that an effort would soon be made to secure an extension of the G. C. & S. F. railroad from Garwood to Victoria by way of Provident City. The Garwood tap now extends from the loop line at Eldridge to the east side of the Colorado river at Garwood, and it is understood that a determined effort will be made to have this line cross the river and extend westward to above indicated. It is very probable that the people of Victoria and Provident City will join in the effort, as it would give them a most convenient outlet to

the northeast, with excellent connections with other lines at Eagle Lake and Sealy.

There is an excellent place at Garwood for the erection of the bridge, and the country to be traversed by such a line, is one of the most promising in Southern Texas. The extension would place Garwood upon a main through line of road, and thus bring that hustling little city to the attention of the outside world. Mr. Griffiths does not propose to leave any stone unturned to secure this extension, and with proper assistance from the people interested, there is no reason why the scheme should fail. We know of no one better qualified to push the proposition than is Mr. Griffiths. — Colorado Citizen.
