CURES FOR MENINGITIS

Disease Epidemic Years Ago, But Yielded To Treatment.

Thus far, despite the fact that all the physicians of the city are on the quiver, not a single case of spinal meningitis has developed in San Antonio during the present epidemic which has been sweeping over North and Central Texas. Sufficient warning has been given and it is not believed that even should the disease make its appearance here it would prove much of a problem, as the Flexner serum will be available, and where this is used in time the mortality rate is very low.

A side from the Flexner, or modern treatment, two other cures have come to light. These were used when spinal meningitis was prevalent in the West forty years ago and had the sanction of physicians of that day. One of these was received by The Express yesterday from J. B. Gay of Columbus. He writes:

"Two ounces of saltpeter to one quart of alcohol; rubbed on the spine from the neck down until there is relief, the feet and legs should stand to the knees, in hot water. Medicine should be given to insure the activity of liver and bowels."

This is from a clipping in my scrap book that was written by a lady who went through an epidemic in Eastern Kansas in 1873, where she had it. She further says: The form of the disease was called cerebro-spinal meningitis. Many died of it before the physicians learned what to do with it. Afterwards they were very successful, so much so that they lost no case they could get to when first taken."

"I trust this remedy may prove a blessing where needed, and as the application is external it can not seriously interfere

with a doctor's regular practice. If it proves successful, as claimed for it, more scrap books than one should contain it."

Another treatment, pronounced efficacious a generation ago, was, related by George Grigby, an aged resident of Gainesville, who described it as follows: "Make an onion poultice and place it on an oilcloth. Lay the oilcloth on a bed in such position that the patient's back will rest on the poultice from head to end of spine. The poultice should be about one-half an inch thick and as hot as the patient can stand and should be replaced as it cools, about every thirty minutes. About one peck of onions should be used for an adult."

Physicians are divided as to the exact cause of spinal meningitis, but the Flexner serum has solved the problem of cure. In that way the doctors are like the

wild animal in the bush, but knows how to kill it.

The most commonly accepted theory, however, is that the disease is the result of a long period of drouth accompanied by inadequate sanitary conditions and followed by rainy, foggy weather. It is a significant fact that, according to records, negroes and others living in the less healthy portions of the city are most susceptible to it. For that matter, however, it is highly contagious, and to prevent its spread cities where the disease has manifested itself are forced to take radical measures to stamp it out.

In Dallas the city commission has taken official cognizance of the epidemic and has at work a force of street cleaners who flush and wash the streets, forcing all refuse through the storm sewers and following this with a liberal application of water. In the rear march a band of men sprinkling disinfectants. The authorities there now believe they have control of the situation, but intend to take extra precautions to prevent a recurrence by a joint attack on dust and unsanitary conditions. —San Antonio Express.
