The future of the farmers' association depends upon the proportion of the crops which will be placed in the hands of the association for marketing. This is a farmers' organization. indirectly upon the success of
the rice farmers.
It seems a bit unusual to offer

intelligent as rice farmers as to
why they should do something to
benefit themselves. The rice as-
sociation is nothing but a band-
ing together of the farmers to
market their crop with judg-
ment, wisdom and practical busi-
ness methods. The cotton farm-
ers are trying to get together to
hold their crop for prices which
they consider proper and justifi-
able by conditions. The cattle rais-
ers are adopting the same method to
save themselves from the grasp
of the speculators. The fruit
growers and every other class of
producers are banding together
to protect themselves from the
class which is seeking to exploit
them for profit. Every interest-
ed person in the rice industry is
seeking to make a profit out of
the business. The millers want
to make as much money as they
can. The jobbers want as high
profits as they can get. The
wholesalers are bending every
effort to make a large profit. All
these efforts are directed mainly
against the farmer and the con-
sumer. Their object is to buy
the farmers' products as low as
possible and sell them as high as
possible. With such a force ar-
rayed against the farmers, what
can he do? He can do just what
the rice farmers have done, com-
bine and gain the strength re-
quired to combat the opposing
forces. That was done two years
ago when the association was
organized. It has demonstrated
what can be done and it remains
for the farmer to determine
whether he will continue in force
this factor which means uniform-
ly profitable prices for his prod-
uct and the protection of the
consumer against unreasonable
high prices, which would reduce
consumption and thereby hit
back at the producer.
