J. R. WOOTEN WILL SPEAK

Columbus Man Will Speak at Bay City on Cotton.

Columbus, Tex., January 21.—Hon. J. R. Wooten of Columbus has been invited by the Bay City Commercial club to address the farmers of that vicinity on the 27th of this month on the subject of the cultivation of cotton. Mr. Wooten has several years experience and made a study of the five original species of cotton and has sought a blending of them to obtain a variety that combined the long staple of the sea island (derived from Gossypium Barbense) and the hardhood of the Orleans or Gossypium Hirsutum.

Mr. Hood of Glen Flora moved to South Texas many years ago with the sole purpose of raising long staple cotton and spent a vast amount of money to obtain a strain that would prove a success. He finally acknowledged that his efforts in that direction were not successful.

tion of Wharton and A. P. Borden of Pierce, both men who pursue original research and with means to carry out their investigations have each attempted to introduce into South Texas a cotton of the qualities mentioned. Both have discontinued their efforts. According to the best information obtainable Mr. Wooten is the first man to produce in South Texas a variety of big boll, long staple cotton bearing five locks until late in the season that will mature early and bear late, not subject to rust, easy to pick and not difficult to gin.

The Post has made several announcements of prices obtained for this cotton the past season, ranging up to 22½ cents a pound. His success has created intense interest in this section of the state and bids fair to revolutionize the industry in this section. Several deputations of farmers have visited Mr. Wooten's plan-

tation during the growing season and the commercial clubs of several neighboring towns have taken sufficient interest in the subject to induce the leading merchants to obtain carload lots of the seed to the end that a market may be created that will induce buyers of long staple to come here to make their purchases.

Long staple cotton is used in the making of fire hose, automobile tires, mercerized fabrics and all that class of goods known as "nearsilk." The price of the long staple is uninfluenced by the production of short staple. It is a commodity independent and alone.

On the occasion of Mr. Wooten's address at Bay City he will offer a prize of \$100 to the grower in South Texas who next season obtains the highest price for long staple cotton.—Houston Post.
