J. J. Raezer of Los Palamos, San Luis Potosi, Mexico, is in Houston. Mr. Raezer is buying machinery for an irrigation plant which will be installed near Los Palamos. When interviewed by a Post representative he said: "I am in Houston for the purpose of purchasing machinery for a large irrigation plant which will be installed near Los Palamos. I am associated with a number of Mexican capitalists of the City of Mexico and we are planning to reclaim a large tract of about 2000 acres of land. The crop will be rice and we will mill the rice at our own plant. The area which we will cultivate is located on the Mexican National railroad and we are equipped with switches and spur tracks that will greatly facilitate shipping. The water that will be used will not be pumped from wells, but will be taken from the Choy river, which runs through our land. At this time a large power plant is being constructed and we will be well equipped before work is started. One of the laws that has been enacted under Madero's rule is the paying of a bonus by the government for irrigated land." —Houston Post.
