Printing a fine likeness of Mr.
Henry J. Frick, the new propi-
etor of the Drummers' home, one
of the leading daily papers in his
old home city, Rock Island, Illi-
nois, has the following to say:

Henry J. Frick, for 16 years
one of the proprietors of the
livery at 1912-1916 Third avenue,
and for the last 10 years sole
owner, has disposed of his inter-
ests in it and will turn over the
business to the new owners, the
Normoyle brothers within a
month. He himself intends to
go to Eagle Lake, Texas, where
he will locate. He is in the Lone
Star state now closing negotia-
tions for some hotel property
there. He is expected home in
about six weeks and will then
prepare to move his family south
in the spring.

Through the consummation of
this deal, the consideration of
which is not made public, Rock
Island loses one of its native sons
and leading business men. Twen-
ty years ago, when he was a
partner of Gottlieb Zwicker in
the livery. Mr. Zwicker re-
tired and the firm became Frick
& Hansen. Mr. Hansen re-
tired in favor of Mr. Kautz and
the firm was conducted under
the name of Frick & Kautz till 10
years ago. Since its institution
more than a quarter of a century
ago the livery has been conducted
in such a manner that it has been
one of the leaders in the line in
Rock Island.

Mr. Frick took an active inter-
est in the politics of the city and
was prominently identified with
the democratic party of the city.
He served two terms as alderman
of the Fourth ward and retired
when the commission form of
government took the place of the
old ward system.
