DIST COURT PROCEEDINGS

Grand Jury Has Light Business—
a Good Record for County.

District court convened Monday of this week in Columbus, Judge M. Kennon presiding. The first official act of the court was empaneling the grand jurors. In delivering his charge to the grand jury, Judge Kennon complimented the county on the fact that no murder or other capital offense had been reported by the officers for investigation since the last term of court; and it looks as if the work of the grand jury for this term will be very light. The personnel of the grand jury is as follows: L. D. Shaw, foreman; J. R. Pinchback, J. B. Brown, E. L. Moore, S. O. McCarty, Otto Richardt, R. H. Beyer, John C. Calhoun, Mike Stapleton, E. R. Willenberg and W. A. Baar; W. J. Harrison door bailiff; Albert Hahn, Oscar Sanders, B. Kolb, Ned Callison and Mark Callison, riding bailiffs.

Tuesday two indictments were returned against Frank Webb and Lawrence C. Pratt, charging them with theft and burglary. This offense was committed by the two boys in breaking into a sleeping car on the Southern Pacific railroad at the Aransas Pass crossing in Eagle Lake, they being caught the next morning by City Marshal Harvey Vineyard with the goods in their possession.

The civil appearance docket was taken up Tuesday morning. There were twenty-three cases filed for this term, of which seventeen were divorce cases, 8 for debt, 1 trespass to try title

case, one for damages for malicious prosecution and one for the recovery of usurious interest and penalty. No jury cases were set for the first week, so the petit jury was sworn in and immediately discharged. A number of jury cases are set for the second week. The first two weeks will be devoted to civil business, the third to common felonies, jail cases having precedence; the fourth week to special venire cases, and the fifth week to non jury civil and such criminal cases as have not been disposed of. Eagle Lake attorneys in attendance on the court were W. S. Strickland, Emanuel Roos, A. J. Wirtz and W. E. Wilson.

Last week while Mr. Harold Townley, son of Mr. J. C. Townley, had a team of horses in the field at his father's place near Chesterville, a house cat, which is thought to have been mad, attacked one of the horses, and when beaten off by Mr. Townley, the cat attacked him, but did not bite him, as the animal was killed by Mr. Townley's dog. It is something unusual for an epidemic of hydrophobia to prevail in the winter time, but this winter we have had mad dogs, mad cats, mad cows and man horses, and six persons have gone from here to the Pasteur Institute in Austin during the winter.

Hon. Geo. Herder of Weimar was here Wednesday looking after the drilling of the deep well at the standpipe and the other work of constructing the new electric light and water plant. Work is progressing nicely at the plant and Mr. Herder hopes to have everything working in apple pie order at the new plant by the first of March.
