## REPORT OF GRAND JURY

Six Bills Returned for Felonies—Two for Misdemeanors.

To Hon. N. KENNON, JUDGE OF THE DISTRICT COURT, HONORABLE SIR:

The Grand Jury empaneled by your honor for the February term, 1912, of the district court of Colorado county, State of Texas, on the eve of its adjournment beg leave to submit the following report:

We congratulate your honor on the peace we note that one of these officers has held six inquests since the last term of this court, some of which develop the fact that the deceased persons came to their death from natural causes induced by old age. Such inquests proceedings are in direct violation of the law.

We recommend to your honor the appointing of a finance committee whose report will be on file at the next term of the court, and when so made be published on time in the several county papers.

We observe that the beauty and usefulness of our lovely district court room are marred by an absence of any covering for the floor and the removal of one of the ornamental circle in the north-west corner of the ceiling. We hope that the commissioners' court in its wise discretion will remedy these defects in the near future.

The Beraca and Philathes classes of the Baptist Sunday School were entertained Thursday night by Miss Cora Green. Several games of progressive peanuts were enjoyed and after the games delicious refreshments were served. Those enjoying the charming hospitality were:

After a pretty thorough inquiry from witnesses from different portions of the county and interviewing some of the road overseers, we find that the public roads of the county are in passably good condition.

After investigating the condition of the public bridges spanning the Colorado river above and below the town of Columbus we find these useful structures, built with the people's money for their use and convenience, badly in need of repair and overhauling, many bolts in the structures requiring tightening.

The east bridge is in need of new sills on the east apron for the proper support of the flooring, in fact, this applies to both aprons of the bridge. An inspection of the north bridge above the town shows several broken and rotten planks which, however, are being replaced by patches at present.

In company with its foster parent and zealous advocate, Mr. Oscar Zumwalt, the grand jury in a body visited and commended a new concrete bridge recently erected by the commissioners' court over Hawe's Branch and it was done we ascertain at a cost to the county of \$100. The ultimate saving to the people by erecting such a bridge instead of an ordinary wooden bridge will be very considerable in the future.

From this point we visited the poor farm and found every thing there tidy and in good order. In all there are 27 inmates on the premises who are comfortable and well cared for. We recommended the placing of two barrels filled with salt water, with buckets attached, at convenient points for the extinguishing of fire at this institution should occasion require.

An investigation of the jail shows that there are seven inmates confined within the walls and we note with satisfaction that there are no insane persons among them. The inmates are well cared for and the institution is in good sanitary condition as expected under the circumstances.
