LISSIE HOME DESTROYED

Fire Destroyed Home of W. G. Layne Wednesday Night.

The handsome two-story residence of Mr. G. A. Layne at Lissie, the former Ashley place for which Mr. Layne recently traded for, was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night, with all the furniture. Mr. and Mrs. Layne and their little son were in Eagle Lake at the time attending the Chase-Lister show, and did not learn of their misfortune until their return to Lissie. An effort was made to get them over the phone, but, for some reason, no connection with Eagle Lake could be gotten. We learn that the house was insured for \$1800, with practically no insurance on the furniture. Mr. Layne was in the city Thursday evening and when seen by a HEADLIGHT reporter, stated that he had no idea how the fire originated, and as he and his family were in Eagle Lake at the time he could offer no theory whatever. Mr. Layne and family lost all their furniture, household goods and clothing, saving nothing except the clothing they wore to Eagle Lake at the time. The Layne home was a pretty two-story house and probably could not be rebuilt for \$3000. We sympathize with these most estimable people in their severe loss.
