TODAY'S CITY PRIMARY

Much Interest Being Taken and Large Vote is Expected.

While there is considerable in-terest felt in the white man's city primary election being held today, still the campaign has been unusually quiet. Quiet from the fact that it has been a rare thing that any one has been heard to express him-self publicly for whom he was was going to vote. For this reason it is hard to make a forecast. Many say the race for mayor will be close. Others say it will be a landslide for Mooney while others say Putney will have a walk-over. Some say Carey will lead the ticket in the alderman's race; others that Lenhart will poll the largest vote, and others say that McKee will be the high man of the three. In the mar-shal's race many say the race is between Thatcher and Callison; others say the race is between Carney and Callison. Many have made forecasts as to whom will lead the ticket, but the forecast of this paper is that Thompson will lead the ticket.

The above is an exact form of the ticket being used in today's primary. The result of the pri-mary today is equivalent to an election. The voting strength of the white vote of this box in a city election is about 225, and it is thought the total vote in to-day's election will reach 180.

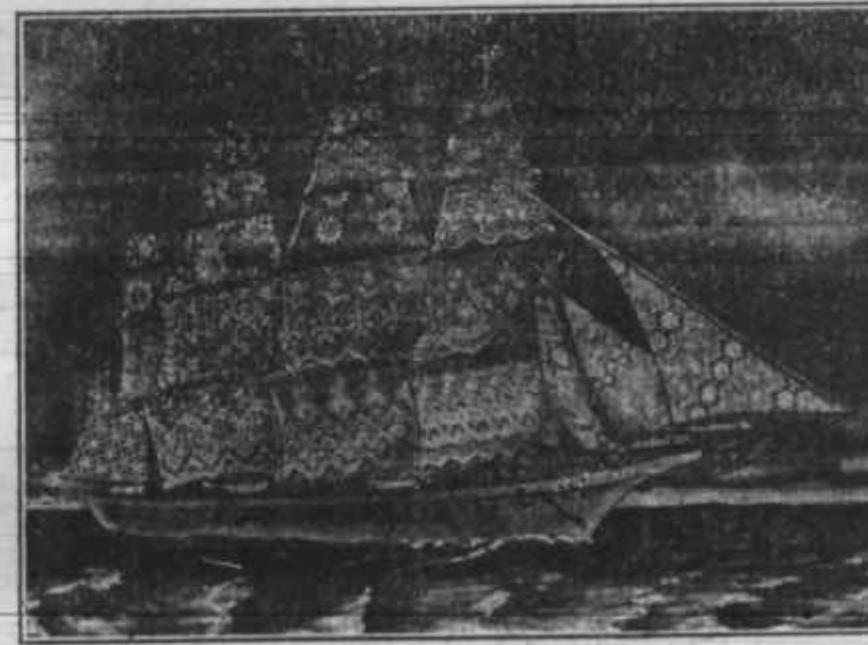
