Home Seekers Visit Eagle Lake.

D. W. McCanna of the Texas
Coast Land Company met at
Houston last Friday a party of
home seekers from the North.
The party came to Eagle Lake
Saturday morning. It consisted
of W. B. Crouch and wife, J. A.
Monroe and wife, Chas. Richards
and T. K. Alexander of Storm
Lake, Iowa; B. L. Field and G.
B. Wilson and wife of Minneap-
olis, Minn. Mr. Field was here
representing a number of per-
sons from his home city. The
party went out to Satusma Ridge
Saturday afternoon and inspected
the Texas Coast Land Co.'s hold-
ings there, the fig, pecan and
fruit orchards, also the Poland
China hogs, Rhode Island Red
chickens, the nursery sheds and
the stock growing in the fields,
and the fig preserving plant, and
the progress made at Satusma Ridge.
The party was very much im-
pressed with the country and in-
vited to dinner by Messrs. Kol-
berg & Anderson the following
day. And on Sunday the party
partook of an elegant dinner at
the Kolberg & Anderson home.
Among other things the dinner
consisted of yellow leg chicken,
yellow sugar yams, cabbage and
other kinds of garden stuff, in-
cluding preserved figs and fig
marmalade, all grown on Satus-
ma Ridge. Each member of
the party was presented with a
jar of preserved figs to take
back to their Northern home as a
souvenir of the occasion. On
Monday the men of the party
purchased several tracts of land
from Mr. McCanna, and are
arranging to have same plowed
and put in shape this season, and
expect to return here in 1913
and make this their permanent
home. Mr. McCanna says these
men are all practical farmers

and very successful in their home
state. The party also visited the
many handsome stores of Eagle
Lake, the sugar refinery, the rice
mills and the lake, and were
highly pleased with this section.
They declare that Eagle Lake in-
deed has a very bright future
and is one of the coming cities of
Texas. Mr. McCanna left Tues-
day afternoon with the home-
seekers' party, which went from
here to Galveston for a short
visit, and from there returned to
their homes in the North.
