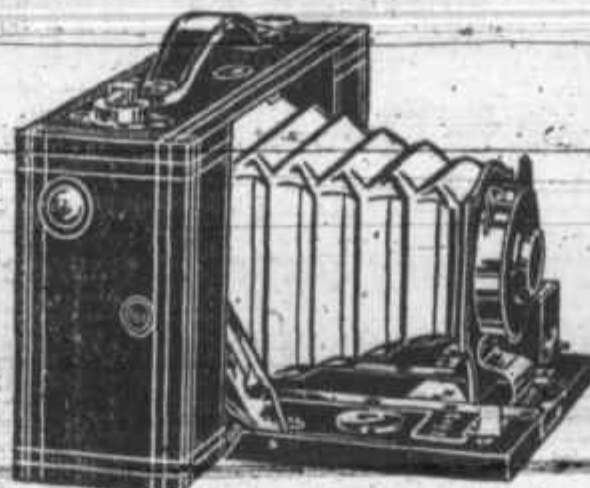
Was Big Snow 45 Years Ago.

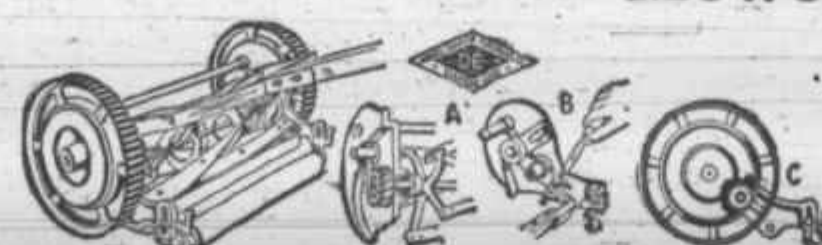
