Why Not Use Donkey Sense?

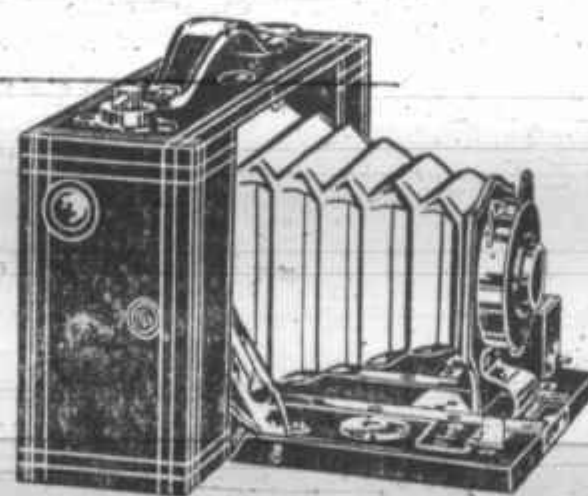
