ATTENTION, SCHOOL PATRONS AND CITIZENS OF EAGLE LAKE.

Important Information on School Matters Given Out Board of School Trustees.

It requires \$4,000 to finance the Eagle Lake schools for a nine months term. Nearly \$7,650 of this goes to pay teachers' salaries. Insurance, fuel, repairs, supplies and incidentals approximate \$800 a year. This money is received partly from the State and partly from local taxation. The district receives from the State \$3200, and from the county \$550. The balance, something over \$4000, is raised by local taxation. With the funds received from the State and County alone the schools could not be maintained only four months. It is absolutely necessary to continue the local tax levy if the schools are to have a nine months' term.

than thirty-five cents for the next term. Should this tax not be continued, the schools could not be operated at all next term. It is impossible to secure teachers to teach for only four months. The course of study can not be completed, nor the grade work kept up to the requirements in less than a nine months' term. An election has been called to determine whether the tax shall be continued. This election is not to levy a new or any additional tax, but merely to decide whether the same tax that has been levied from year to year for the past twenty years shall be continued. Every patron and friend of the school should give his vote for the tax. It is estimated that the local tax is continued. Without it Eagle Lake will have no school next year.
