The John Slutter Farm Sold.

Ex-Mayor W. S. Strickland yesterday swung one of the largest real estate deals that has been made in this section for some time, he having sold the John Slutter farm of about 2000 acres, five miles from Eagle Lake to Columbus parties. The purchasers are Kenneth Brandon, Alvie Harbert, L. D. Shaw and Harbert Simpson. The Slutter farm is one of the best improved farms in this section. It was not sold by the acre, but as a whole, the amount involved being \$61,000.00. While the deal has not fully been closed, the titles having yet to be passed upon, there is no doubt but what it will go through all right, as earnest money have already been put up. Mr. John Brigham will be manager of the farm for the new owners and it is very likely that it will be placed in charge just as soon as the final papers are drawn up so as to farm the present year's crop.

Mr. Wm. J. McGee, one of the best potato growers of this section, was a pleasant caller at this office Wednesday afternoon while in the city from his plantation. He showed us a half dozen or more potatoes which were larger than hen's eggs, showing that he will likely be among the very first of the potato men of this community to commence digging. Mr. McGee says the potatoes of this entire section are as fine as could possibly be, and that unless something unusual happens this section will produce the largest and finest potato crop in its history. Mr. McGee, while not gifted to boasting of his crop, and he is a man that makes no exorbitant estimates, says he believes if the season remains favorable he will make an average of one hundred and fifty bushels to the acre. His crop is practically all Northern seed, with the exception of a few acres of native seed which usually produce a larger yield than the Northern seed but come on the market later in the season.

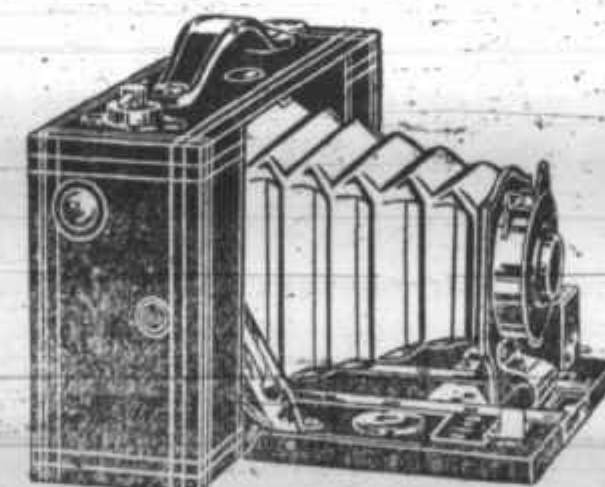

Fear of the Axman Keeping Negro Labor

Columbus, Tex., April 17—The murderous deeds of the axman have had the effect of spreading terror among the negroes around Columbus to the extent that colored labor is becoming seriously disorganized. It is stated by reliable citizens that in some instances at night as many as fifteen or twenty negroes will congregate in the same building and shut themselves in by barring the doors and nailing down the windows securely for protection against the stealthy raids of these "ax murders."

Before adjournment of the meeting, however, appropriate resolutions were offered by Geo. Best and were passed and in which the governor was requested to offer such reward as might be instrumental in leading to the arrest and conviction of the party or parties guilty of these foul murders.

This meeting, called and presided over by Hon. J. R. Wooten, with County Judge J. J. Mansfield acting as secretary, was attended by a goodly number of many of the best white citizens and a large crowd of negroes.

Among the whites who delivered timely addresses of a reassuring character, were Sheriff E. B. Mayes, Judge Mansfield, Judge A. A. Gregory, O. A. Zumwalt, Captain Geo. H. Little of Columbus and ex-Mayor W. S. Strickland of Eagle Lake.

Previous to the meeting some of the leading citizens expressed regret that Governor Colquitt has not seen fit to offer a reward sufficiently large to induce greater activity in order to apprehend and bring to justice the perpetrator or perpetrators of these "ax murders."

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The editor is in receipt of a letter from Mr. C. N. And while I am on this subject, want to say to you that I would like very much for your good people to consider putting in a thorough sewer system, and to that end will cheerfully contribute \$250 more if necessary towards building same. You are a hustler and I am strictly with you and the good people of Eagle Lake on anything that will help make it the most attractive little city in Texas. Hope to see you soon.
