Columbus, Texas, April 16.—The examining trials of Jim Fields and his wife, Ida Fields, both negroes, charged jointly on charges relative to the ax killings at Glidden, of which Lyle Finucane, negro, and the negro woman and five children of the Monroe family were victims, were held here today before Justice of the Peace A. A. Gregory. Ida was allowed bail, the amount to be fixed later, while her husband was remanded to jail without bail.

Two Negroes Slain in Axman Panic at Smithville.

Smithville, Texas, April 16.—The inability of a negro boy to go to sleep here last night, compounded with fear of the axman, started a panic among members of his race, with the result that two are dead.

Ernest Smothers, unable to sleep, arose and walked about the room. Other members of the family heard him moving about and, nerves taunted by the long watches of a week, construed the sounds as indicating a vis-

it from the axman. An alarm was raised and West Duval, who was guarding the house, ran to the room, and without looking about him shot at the supposed intruder, killing him instantly.

The sound of the shooting aroused a neighbor, Max Warren, who grabbed a gun and hastened over to see if he could render assistance. When he arrived at the house his nerve failed and he beat a retreat for home. Before he had traversed half the distance, the armed watchers from other houses were in the street. Some one raised the cry, "There goes the axman," and a second later Warren was the object of a fusillade. He was dead when the watchers reached him.

The report of the committee on resolutions was read and adopted. Motion was made and carried that the corresponding secretary write to the Secretary of Navy and to Governor Colquitt petitioning them to use water in the christening of the Battleship Texas.
