EAGLE LAKE WILL HAVE CREAMERY RUNNING WITHIN NINETY DAYS.

The people of Eagle Lake have been talking creamery and agitating the question of a creamery here for a long time, but the creamery is now an assurance and Eagle Lake will have a creamery in operation within ninety days, and probably sooner, and the business will likely be known as the Eagle Lake Creamery Company. It will have a capital stock of \$1500, all of which stock has been subscribed in stock of twenty-five dollar shares by Eagle Lake people. Messrs. T. L. Smith, A. H. Koennecke and Fritz Engelhard, all three of whom are always ready and willing to work for anything for the advancement and up-building of Eagle Lake, last Saturday finished up the work of obtaining subscribers to the stock. The creamery will be operated in connection with the ice plant and the business will be begun just as soon as the machinery arrives and can be installed. A meeting of the stockholders of the creamery company will be held next week at which time oficers and directors will be elected and plans formed for active business. This paper has always contended that a creamery was needed here, and now that we are to get one, it sincerely hopes that all the people of Eagle Lake will insist on Eagle Lake creamery products and in that way encourage the new industry and build up a paying creamery business for our city.
