Columbus a Great Sailor.

Columbus with his fleet of three ships, the Santa Maria, the Pinta and the Nina, sailed from Palos, Spain, August 3, 1492, and landed on Watling Island, one of the Bahama Islands, October 12, 1492. The time was made 47 1/7 miles per day, counting 24 hours a day. The same distance is now covered by modern steam ships in less than seven days and motor boats are made which go more than 50 miles per hour. There were no ocean cables in those days and Columbus' fleet was not equipped with wireless telegraphic instruments. Unlike the real estate sharks of today, the natives did not meet Columbus with an automobile. More than that, the natives refused to furnish the stranger with a railroad guide or map of the outlying territory. So Chris was compelled to sail back home without gaining much information in regard to the country. A while after this a guy named Amerigo Vesputi came over and discovered that the country was quite extensive, extending as far west as St. Louis. Everybody went wild over the discovery and they named the new country after Amerigo. However, many people in New York, Boston and Philadelphia, believe now that North America extends as far west as Denver. Let that be as it may, Columbus was a great sailor, considering the methods of seafaring in those days.

The United States Department of Commerce and Labor has issued its report on cotton ginned in Texas in 1911 by counties.

There were 4,107,152 bales ginned in the state which is an increase over 1910 of 1,157,184 bales or 28.2 per cent. Ellis county ranked first with 136,478 bales ginned. McLennan second with 120,801, and Hill third with 117,221 bales ginned. Colorado county has a total of 18,896 bales ginned during this year which is an increase over the previous year of 5,884 bales. Texas produced 28 per cent of the cotton grown in the United States and 21 percent of the world's product.
