Columbus, Texas, June 18—Potatoes as a money making crop have demonstrated themselves in Colorado County. One farmer has cleared \$2,000 on twenty-five acres, his crop bringing from \$1.40 to \$1.80 per bushel. It is indicated that the acreage will be largely increased next season.

The above clipping from the daily papers shows that the potato industry is spreading to all parts of Colorado county. While the potato crop, as a whole, was not up to expectations this year, the planters, for the most part, made money. We have in mind one planter of this section who cleared \$2200 on twenty-five acres, and another who gathered six car loads of potatoes on twenty-five acres, being the largest yield of which we have heard, but we have been unable to learn the prices which the latter received and the amount in money he realized from his crop.

Creamery Begins Next Week.

Work on the creamery plant has advanced far enough so that the management can set a definite date for opening. The building is practically completed, painting is well under way and will probably be finished by Monday. The ice cream machinery is now being installed and the plant will be ready for business June 28th, and on that morning the plant will be ready to receive sweet cream and fresh milk in any quantity and will receive regularly after that date.

The butter machinery has not arrived yet so they will not be in position to receive sour cream or anything else that cannot be used for ice cream purposes.

The manager would like to have people with these products to sell, call on him and arrange to begin to deliver Friday, June 28th, so as to be assured of enough to start running on that day.

In this town a prize for a name to be given the ice cream they will manufacture. They are anxious for an appropriate name and hope the response will be generous.

Eagle Lake is to have a third lumber yard. The Brown-Bell Lumber Company of Houston has leased the Phillips property on Main Street near the Eagle Lake Tin Co., and will establish a complete lumber yard and engage in the lumber and general builders' hardware business. A portion of the stock is now in transit and we are informed that the new yard will be open for business in a very short time.

Down With Gossip.

The current issue of the Texas Christian Advocate contains an editorial worth while on "The Habit of Gossip." Here it is: "Once upon a time it was customary to assign the privilege of gossip to the women, but this was an injustice to them. They are not the only offenders in matters of this sort. Men are often the worst of the gossip; and not only men, but even preachers indulge in the habit. Nothing is more common when a company of preachers get together than to discuss the weakness and foibles of their absent brethren. For the most part they do not mean to do any harm, for they are the warm friends of the very brethren about whom they talk. But the harm comes in when some one of them makes it his business to run to the absent brother and try to relate the conversation he happened to hear about him and his doing so."

the original talk never dreamed of. In this way the brother's feelings are wounded and as a result he is pained and feels unkindly toward someone who never thought to injure him. As a rule, it is best not to indulge in the habit of small talk about people. It is neither elevating nor instructive. Other themes are of more importance. There is nothing in the faults or weaknesses of people worthy of remark, and to dwell upon such things ought to be below the attention of intelligent men and women. Nevertheless, those who often do this never think of doing harm to any one, and when they do it no harm ever comes of it unless some designing person happens to hear it and goes with evil intent and repeats it to the person about whom the remark is made. This latter person is the idle gossip who does the mischief. He is a sort of snake in the grass lying in wait to make trouble. That sort of person, be he man or woman or preacher, is to be dread; and when he or she is around you need to be on your guard in what you say about your neighbor or your friends. His or her business is to repeat it and to exaggerate it. The Lord pity the mischief-making dispenser of gossip."

Bearing false witness against your neighbor is a sin that causes much unhappiness in this world. The gossips who lurk in the shadows find the marks for their venomous shafts in those who stand in the sunshine. The average tale-bearer always begins, "I am told," or "it is being said," or "I have heard." He never places the responsibility for a rumor, carefully covering his own tracks. The pesky disease carrying fly is with us only in the summer time. The gossip flies about all the year carrying filthy slander. Swat him at every opportunity.

Will Raise the Titanic.

When the Great Steamship Titanic went down, it is estimated that the entire loss of ship and contents was \$25,000,000. If the ship can be raised the greater part of this can be saved. An engineer has been making figures and estimates that the ship can be raised for \$1,000,000, and it is more than probable that the work will be begun soon. The water is said to be two miles deep where the great ship went down, but the engineers say that on account of the increasing density of the water the ship did not go to the bottom, but only as far down as her weight could overcome the resistance, which they contend was not very far.

The plan proposed for raising the hulk is to lower a large number of "highly magnetic" grapples, and when these adhere to the sunken hulk it will be pulled to the surface by a fleet of barges.

The "Spare Hours."

In Albany, a few days ago, a man who had been a telegraph operator for forty-five years, committed suicide because his "wire" had been given to a younger employee. The older man was assigned to other work, the change being made because his successor could operate a typewriter—something the older man had never learned to do.
