

Charles Dwyer Died Suddenly in Oklahoma.

A telegram received at 9:45 last night announced the sudden death in Tulsa, Okla., of Charles Dwyer, age 28. His wife, who was visiting her husband's mother here, Mrs. Ed. Dwyer, 610 South Fifth Street, and yesterday afternoon at 3:25 a message reached her, stating that Mr. Dwyer was ill. Mrs. Dwyer made preparations for a hurried departure and she left on the Katy limited for Tulsa yesterday afternoon. While en route to her husband's side, he passed away.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed this morning, and it is not known positively whether the body will be brought here for interment.

Deceased, who was in business at Tulsa, was a resident of Waco at one time. He was well known and highly esteemed here, being a friend of many of the city's friends and most kind and affectionate to his family.

A particularly sad feature in connection with Mr. Dwyer's death is the fact that he is the sixth member of the family of Mrs. Ed. Dwyer to pass away in the past two years.

Besides his wife, deceased is survived by two children, and to them sincere condolence is extended.—Waco Tribune.

The headlight extends congratulations and wishes for this recently formed couple a long, happy and prosperous life.

While playing baseball at Wharton last Friday afternoon, Paul Brown was struck on the head with a thrown ball while he was at the bat and rendered unconscious. He was brought home the following day and for a time his condition was critical, it having been decided to take him to the hospital in Houston when he began to show signs of improvement. 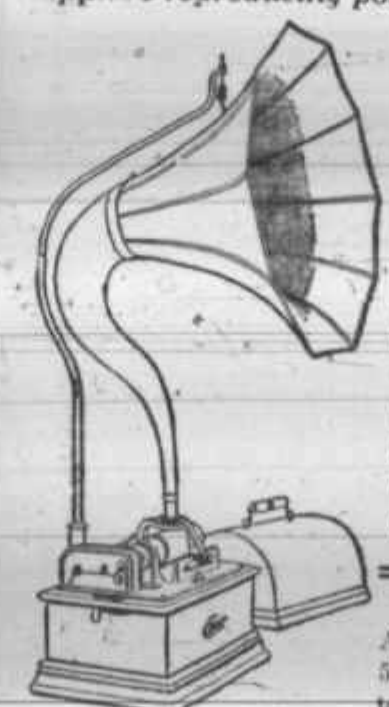
