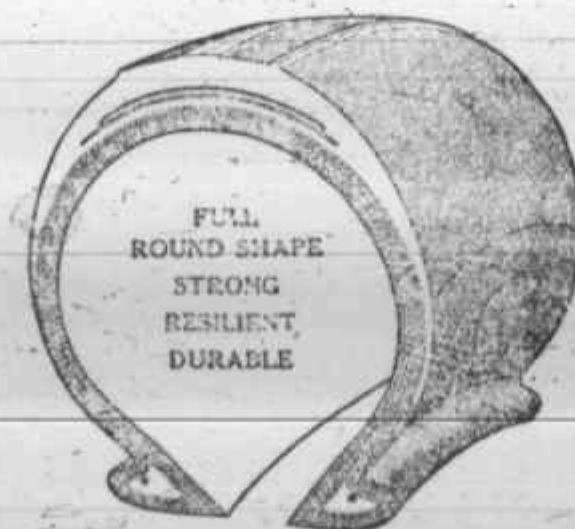

Home Hint.

A dash of lemon juice in plain water makes a cleansing tooth wash, not only removing the tartar, but sweetening the breath.

Cold water, a tablespoonful of ammonia and soap will move machine grease where other means would not answer on account of colors running.

By rubbing nickel and silver ornaments with a woolen cloth saturated with spirits of ammonia, they may be kept very bright with but little trouble.

Eggs will keep well packed in dry salt, with the small end down. Grease the shell with lard before packing, and pour melted lard over the top layer of salt.

Turpentine mixed with carbolic acid and kept in open vessels about the room will greatly lessen the risk of contagion in scarlet fever, diphtheria and kindred diseases.

Marmalade should be kept in the dark, as the light acts chemically upon the contents. If your fruit pantry or store room is light put each glass jar into a paper sack and tie on with cord.

It is not generally known that castor oil may be more easily taken mingled with the juice of an orange, a little sugar being added to the juice, if the orange is not sweet. The difference between this and any other mode of taking this valuable medicine is surprising.

The best way to clean an invalid's room is to rub the carpet all over with a cloth wrung out of ammonia diluted with a little warm water, rinsing and turning the cloth as the dust and dirt collects upon it. Change the water frequently. This is far better than sweeping, and raises no unpleasant dust in the room.—Ex.

Some Figures About Texas.

The following interesting figures about the Lone Star State are taken from a campaign card circulated by J. T. Robison, general land commissioner, who is a candidate to succeed himself: Texas has 249 counties.

Square miles, 295,000.

Acres, 169,600,000.

Population, 3,896,542.

School children, 1911, 961,406.

Land given for permanent public free schools, 45,000,000 acres.

For all school purposes, \$2,000,000 acres.

Land notes belonging to the permanent free school fund, \$50,000,000. Bonds, \$18,000,000.

Unsold land, 3,000,000 acres.

Total expenditure for free education annually, \$13,000,000.

Annual receipts of the land office, \$2,780,000.

While a clerk in the land office, Mr. Robison originated the present system of selling the school land, and under this system he claims the land sold in the last seven years has brought to the school fund about \$20,000,000 more than it would have brought under the old system. He also claims that the expense of handling the State's land business has been reduced \$20,120 a year.
