

A Letter From Colorado.

The following letter from one of Eagle Lake's citizens who is spending the summer in Manitou, Colorado, was received last week, but on account of the crowded condition of last issue, was carried over until this week:

Friend Bruce:—We arrived in Manitou about 11:30 Thursday. I knew Texas was large, but never realized just how great a State it was. I was told before leaving that I would find it very hot and disagreeable through the Panhandle, but never was I more pleasantly surprised. It was cool, good rains having fallen throughout all that country; everything so green and spring-like. From the beginning of the Panhandle until we arrived at Pueblo, everything denoted prosperity, many nice villages all along the route. The people were friendly, cotton fields, some 10 feet high, but I am told cotton don't grow much taller here. I saw my first wheat and told Eula Dea it must be alfalfa (but I had never seen that either.) A man sitting near us told me it was wheat. The fields were beautiful. Bruce, you can't imagine how home-sick we are. On a wakening the second morning, from the windows of our berth, there right near us, were the first mountains I had ever seen. They were grand and just beyond them, were the Spanish Peaks, all white with snow. They looked like so many large diamonds, caused by reflection of the sun. Pueblo has a population of 57,000 and altitude of 4656 feet. We had through tickets to Manitou, but the T. & R. V. only came as far as Colorado Springs, so we came from there to Manitou, 9 miles, by auto. Street cars also run between the two

places. In the afternoon we struck out to find a comfortable cottage for the season, which we were very fortunate in finding. A beautiful brand new 8-room cottage, everything modern and all conveniences, just two blocks from the Soda-Iron-Sulphur Springs. We use throughout house water from the mountains. Wish you Eagle Lake people could be here to enjoy it, as cold as it had ice in it and very clear and soft. We are surrounded by mountains almost and our cellar is dug out into the edge of a mountain. I am feeling so much better already; and believe in two months, if I continue drinking this soda water from the springs, I will be entirely cured. We try all the different springs first, to find which is best for us. Bruce, I do wish you would make about half the trip to Manitou, Colorado, especially the sick ones. See Brother Joe and insist on him coming. This is my first trip in all my life (as old as I am) but I want to be here every summer from now on. Our address is 206 Pawnee Ave., Manitou, Colo. We will gladly meet any Eagle Lake people if they will write us, as we are awfully lonesome here among strangers.
