Not Politics But Railroad Service.

On the 24th, of June, 1912, a
local shipment left Austin for
Garwood, Texas. The shipment
consisted of three articles one
box, one piece of 3 inch pipe, one
piece of shaft 5 feet long. This
local shipment was loaded in car
S. W. No. 1844. Shipped to
Hempstead. There transferred in
car S. P. No. 32039. From
Hempstead it was loaded in car
A. T. No. 32045 to Brenham. The
shipment was transferred at
Brenham in car T. R. R. No.
56575 to Sealy. From Sealy it
was transferred in car A. T. No.
34412 to Eagle Lake. At Eagle
Lake one piece checked short or
carried by and brought back
two days later. The two pieces
arrived at Garwood July 3rd, and
the last piece arrived July 5th, at
11:20. The purchaser was at a
loss of \$4.00 per day for eleven
days when shipment should have
gone through in twenty-four
hours, and I, myself, was at a
loss of \$5.00 per day waiting for
the material to arrive. My pray-
er is God help the poor railroad
employees who are drawing sal-
aries and not giving service.

Stock Law Election.

In Chambers:

Whereas, upon the petition of
more than fifty freeholders, res-
ident citizens of Justice Precinct
No. 5 of Colorado County, the
Honorable Commissioners' Court
on the 14th, day of May, 1912,
made and entered an order for
an election to be held for the
purpose of determining whether
or not horses, mules, jacks, jen-
nets, and cattle shall be per-
mitted to run at large within said
Justice Precinct, which said
precinct or subdivision is more
fully described by metes and
bounds as follows, to-wit:

Beginning on the East bank of
the Colorado River at the North
West corner of the G. S. Snider
League, being the South West
corner of Justice Precinct No. 7;
thence down the Colorado River
with its meanderings to the
Wharton County line; thence
North Easterly with the line be-
tween Wharton and Colorado
County to the San Bernado
River, being the Austin County
line; thence up the San Bernado
River with its meanderings to
the South East corner of H. &
T. C. R. Co.'s Survey No. 3,
being the South East corner of
Justice Precinct No. 6; thence
West with the South lines of the
said H. & T. C. R. Co.'s Sur-
vey No. 3 and M. A. Posey Sur-
vey to the West corner of the
Posey Survey; thence South-
west with the line of the Ger-
man Immigration Co.'s Survey
to its South corner; thence
North West with the line of the
George Brune Survey to its North
corner; thence South East with
the line of the Adam Becker sur-
vey to its South corner; thence
North West with the line of the
Columbus Tap R. R. Co.'s Sur-
vey No. 663 to its North corner;
thence South West with the
line of the Columbus Tap R. R.
Co.'s Survey No. 663 to its West
corner; thence North West with
the line of the P. K. Bartleson
League to its North corner;
thence South West with the
North West lines of the said
Bartleson League and the Mar-
tin D. Ramsey Surveys to the
track of the G. H. & S. A. R. R.
Co.; thence North West with the
G. H. & S. A. R. R. Co.'s track
to the North corner of the G. S.
Snider League; thence South
West with the lines of the Snid-
er and R. Alley League to the
place of beginning.

Therefore, pursuant to the or-
der of the Honorable Commis-
sioners' Court, and by virtue of
the authority vested in me by
the Constitution and Laws of the
State of Texas; it is hereby or-
dered that an election of the
freeholders who are also qual-
ified voters, residing within said
Justice Precinct No. 5, shall be
held in accordance with law on

Saturday the 27th, day of July
A. D. 1912, and the polls for said
election shall be opened at the
usual voting place in the City of
Eagle Lake, within said Justice
Precinct, and all voters at said
election desiring to prevent the
animals designated in this order
from running at large within the
said subdivision shall place upon
their ballots the words "For the
stock law," and those in favor of
allowing such animals to run at
large shall place upon their bal-
lots the words "Against the stock
law."

It is further ordered that A.
J. Wirtz be appointed Presiding
Officer of said election and W. Y.
Westmoreland, Robert E. Walk-
er and H. P. Hahn be appointed
Judges, who, collectively shall
constitute the managers of said
election, and they are hereby fully
authorized, empowered and
directed to appoint their clerks,
and to hold said election and
make return thereof as the law
provides.

It is further ordered that pub-
lic notice of said election shall be
given by the publication of this
order in the Weimar Mercury,
a newspaper published in
Colorado County, for at least
thirty days before the day of
election.

In testimony whereof, I here-
unto place my official signature,
together with the seal of my of-
fice, at Columbus, Texas, this
24th day of June, A. D. 1912.

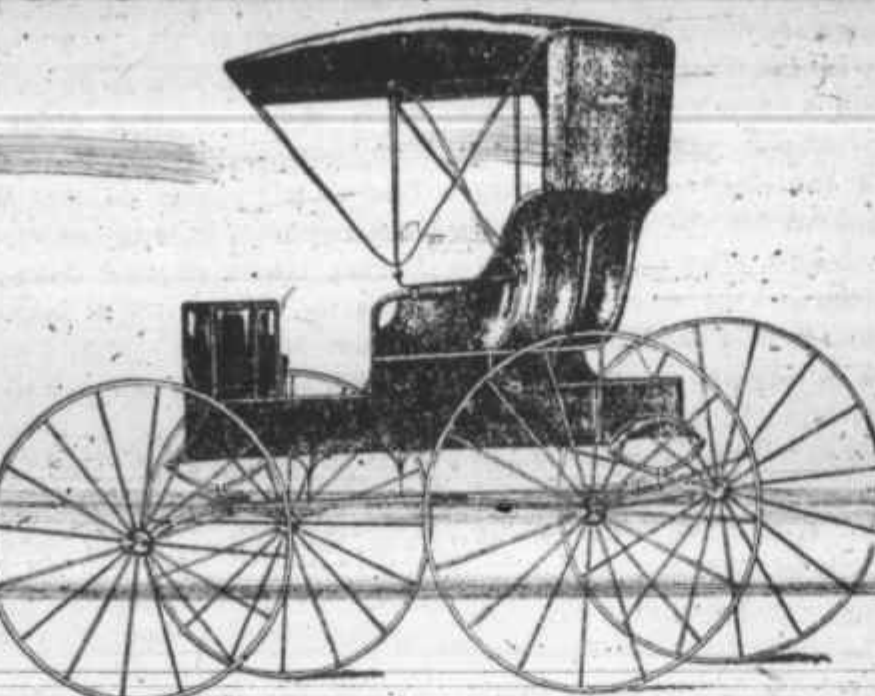
