Randell's Cayse Ascendant.

There is increasing evidence, as the campaign progresses, that the Democratic voters are more and more realizing that Mr. Randell is the one consistent, logical candidate for United States Senator. People who were led off for a while by the pretty rhetoric of Mr. Sheppard or the standpoint features of Colonel Wolters' campaign are awakening to the fact that Randell has stood sturdily for years for the very principles and policies now declared to be the political faith of Texas Democrats. And there is an awakening to the fact that defeat of Randell would be in a way retreat from the stand the Texas Democracy has taken, reversal of its utterances. How keenly the people are realizing these things is evidenced by what is taking place. And it is significant that these requests come frequently from places where he has visited and has already made an address.

"We realize that there is more of importance in your candidacy than we believed or appreciated when you were here. You must come again." These things could not occur if it were not a fact that the Democrats of Texas are coming to keener appreciation that the aspirations of the Sherman man are part and parcel—as to principles and policies—of the representative and dominant element of Texas Democracy. The Tribune repeats its assurance that if all who really believe in and favor the attitude and course of Randell stand firmly by him in the primary of July he will receive far more than a plurality vote. He will receive a vote that will be a mandate to the Thirty-third legislature.
