

Garwood Man Found Dead.

Garwood, Texas, July 15.—The dead body found near Lyndon, Osage County, Kansas, the latter part of June was that of F. W. Staib, brother of G. E. Staib of this city. Mr. Staib left here on June 11 for Kansas, where he expected to work. Mr. Staib was subject to appendicitis and was at several times attacked while here, stating that it would some day get him. He refused to be operated on. He was in his forty-ninth year and had never married. He is survived by two brothers, one here and another in Kansas, which is their native state.

The articles found on the body were sent to Mr. J. L. Chapman of this city, who in turn had them sent to Mr. Staib for identification. When he left here the deceased had between \$50 and \$100, but when found he had no money. He was a very quiet fellow and spent but very little.

Mr. Staib of this place will very likely go to Kansas and get whatever information he can as to where his brother had been and where he was headed for, also to settle all expenses that were incurred in burying the body.

When found the deceased had been apparently dead for several days. The only thing found that would lead to any identification or communication was a blank note with the name of the Garwood State Bank printed thereon. The Kansas parties at once got in communication with Cashier J. L. Chapman, who wrote for the articles to be identified.

Example of Successful Farming

C. H. Allison of Eagle Lake, who has been here this week, is one of the best examples of our successful farmers. He owns 135 acres of land in the bottom between Eagle Lake and the river, a part of the former Quin F. Walker plantation. He had sixteen acres of this land in potatoes this year and sold from it \$2,100.00 worth of potatoes. The land was badly poisoned with Johnson grass and he is now turning it preparing for the second planting. He purchased 120 goats of Burns & Terrell for \$160 and 60 sheep of Fraser Bros. for \$160. The sheep and goats follow the turning plows and eat the Johnson grass roots as they are turned out of the ground, of which they are very fond. From a recent plowing of his land he fattened the sheep and goats, also a number of calves, for sale.

Fort Worth, he sent 40 of the sheep, which he sold at \$1 per head. He has since sold 50 of the goats for \$75 and still has as many head left as he had to start with. He has practically got his money back for the original purchase, in one year, and his stock are in better condition. He finds sheep and goats both very profitable, especially where they can follow the plows in Johnson grass land, and in addition to being profitable as money producers, they have also been very valuable to the land in eradicating the Johnson grass.

Mr. Allison says that the sheep and goats will pull out from the fresh plowed land, all the Johnson grass roots that are the least bit exposed, and the goats will paw the ground in search of them. He is now preparing to improve his stock of goats, by the purchase of Angoras from Mr. Tait, and will go into the business more extensively. The common goats he now has, and which cost him less than \$1.00 per head, he can sell for \$2.50 per head. Mr. Allison seems to have solved the problem as to the most practicable use to be made of the Johnson grass bottom lands, and he can now

make a cash sale of his little farm at a profit of \$4,250.00 on what it cost him two or three years ago. If anybody else can beat this in farming on a small scale, we have not heard of him. —Colorado Citizen.

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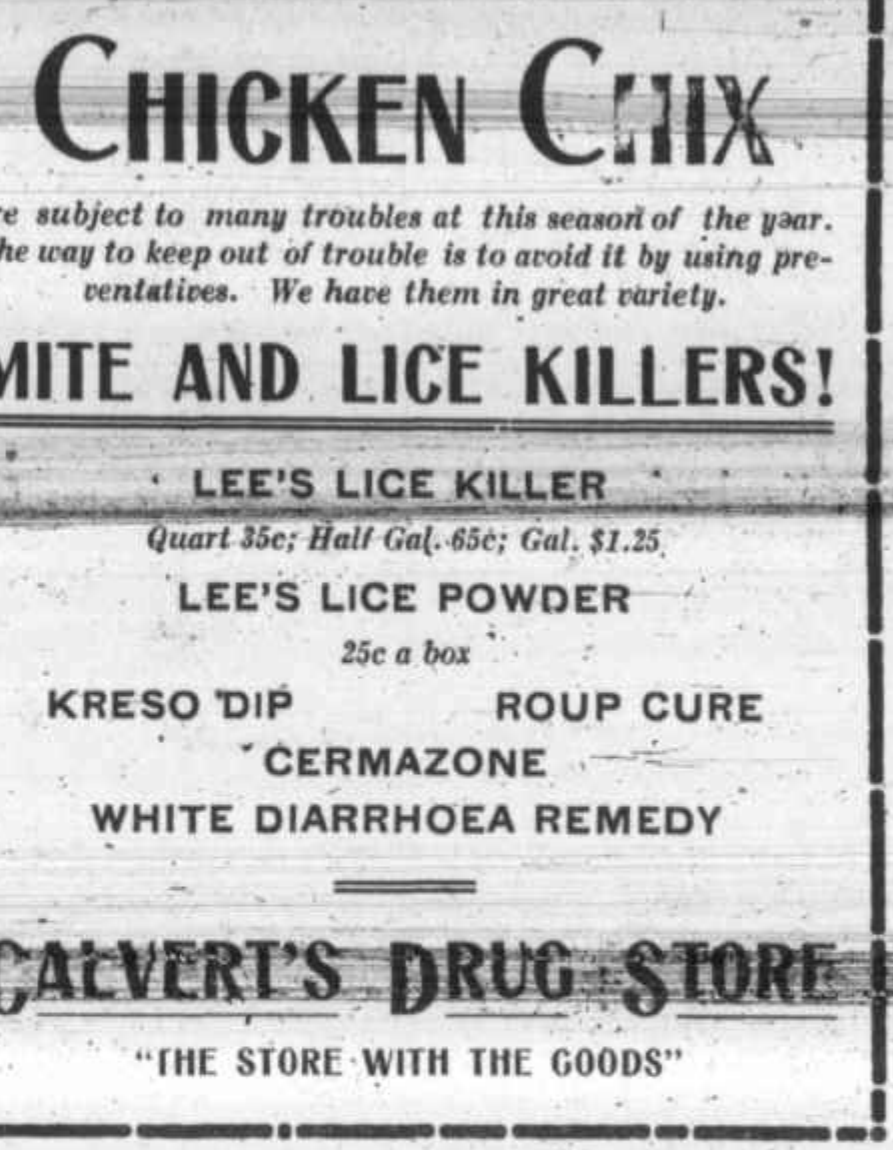
