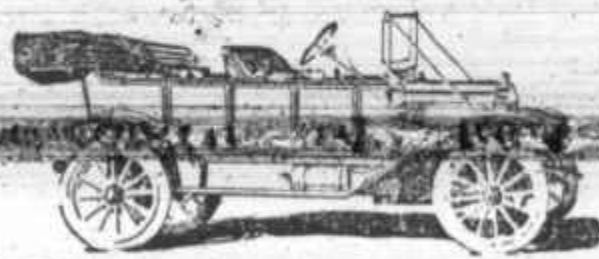

TEXAS PEACH IS A WINNER

The Texas peach is the King of Fruits and the fruit of kings. It is invited into the parlors of the great and is welcomed in the hotel of the poor of both hemispheres. It has met its rival at home and abroad on most every table on the globe and by its natural beauty and delightful personality it has conquered all competitors and today its appearance in the market is an annual event of importance in every household, in America and its disappearance is the consumer's regret. Public interest is so deeply centered in its arrival at the market that it travels in special trains running at full speed in order to relieve the anxiety of the waiting public and its welcome is so cordial that cold storage plants have been erected in order to prolong its stay in the community. Canneries and preserving plants are

season in order to preserve its eating qualities for the table of the nation during the entire year.

The family peach tree can be found in most every county in the State, but the commercial peach belt is confined largely to East Texas. The exact number of bearing peach trees in the State is not of record but competent authority estimates it at seven millions. During the peach season of 1910 we shipped to the market 4500 cars of peaches and supplied our local wants as well as run our canneries during the peach season.

The peach industry has been pouring into the channels of trade a golden stream of wealth. The farm value of the peach production in 1910 is estimated as high as \$7,000,000. The rapid growth of the industry during the past decade and the wide extension of the commercial peach belt has been one of the marvels of our development.

At first the Texas peach entered the market under an assumed name, masquerading as a California product, but it soon threw off its disguise and like all native Texans, outstripped its competitors and today it is master of the world's trade.

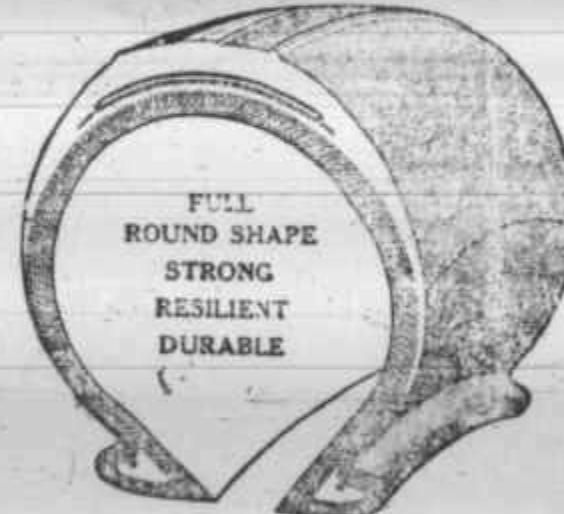

Pecan Growing in South Texas

And What This Industry will Mean to Owners of Land Near Eagle Lake

Fortunate is the possessor of landed property in this section, be the property ever so small, if that owner can but realize and take advantage of the importance of the pecan as a commercial investment. The pecan is the king of nuts, and our section is its native home.

The improved soft shell pecan excels the apple, the orange, the fig, the peach, the pear, or any other fruit in productiveness and profit. As a lasting investment there is nothing that will compare with it, for it is still increasing in yield and growth when the apple or orange tree is ready to be cut down in unprofitable old age.

Its planting and culture does not interfere with other fruit or field crops, for between the pecans spaced at 40 or 45 feet apart) can be planted the fig, orange, peach, pear, plum, apple or grape, the strawberry, dewberry, blackberry, cotton, corn, peanuts, potatoes, or other field or truck crops, which will add to the income from the land for many years.

Read what honored men say about planting of pecans—read and believe. The following are all authenticated paragraphs from papers and addresses given at meetings of the American Pomological society, the Texas Farmers' Congress, Texas Horticultural society, National Nut Growers' association and from letters by persons of national repute.

Hon. E. W. Kirkpatrick, president of the National Nut Growers' Association: "The importance of pecan growing cannot be overestimated. The pecan tree is one of our greatest natural resources and this fact is being recognized by the foremost men of the south. Unlike other trees, it endures hundreds of years and becomes more valuable with age. He who plants a pecan tree confers a blessing that cannot be equalled by any other calling. More pleasure and profit can be gotten from one acre of pecans than from ten or twenty or more acres of other crops. We should not be deterred from planting pecans on the ground that we have to wait for results, because he who does not plant at all waits longer than he who plants. Growing fine pecans is elevating and satisfying. This industry has everything which is pleasing and is in harmony with God's laws. . . . Of all trees grown in a season, some trees have produced \$100 worth of nuts in the walnut groves of California. It excels the olive, the orange, the lemon, the apple, the prune, the peach, the apricot and the grape; it excels everything. What greater oversight can we make than to neglect the pecan tree?"

John S. Kerr, Sherman, Texas: "Pecan orcharding has passed the experimental stage. The phenomenal success so far attained, the profitability and the permanence of the enterprise, the transformation of large areas of cheap lands into abiding gold mines, as it were, is attracting the best talent of the land and the investment of large capital, and there probably can be no better investment. The work of planting the improved pecan is being pushed just as fast as the land and the trees can be made ready. The demand for trees is immense. Who plants pecans provides for both present and future generations."

F. T. Ramsey, Austin, Texas: "On our nursery we grow pecans on black prairie land. Pecans in Texas bear oftener than they do farther east and are seldom or never bothered with any disease. There is so much good pecan land in Texas that it is unnecessary to talk about the rest. Right near Austin is one tree from which were weighed in one crop fifteen bushels. This has been surpassed by other trees in Texas. The travelers who speak with egotistical complacency of owning an orange grove in California, they 'make me laugh out in meetin'.' They just do not know about pecans. The life insurance companies have a rival. Instead of paying \$100 a year premium, borrow \$1,000 on long time and buy land and plant it in improved pecans. The interest will be \$100 a year. The rent on the crop grown between the rows of pecans will pay taxes and interest. Soon the nuts pay the loan, then before many years you collect the full amount of your insurance each year and have no premium to pay, and you leave your heirs something very much better than an insurance policy."

Hon. H. E. Van Deman, Washington, D. C.: "There are pecans in Louisiana that have been known to bear as much as ten barrels of nuts in one season. There are pecan trees growing today that are over 500 years old. Who plants a pecan tree provides a life insurance which no company in the United States can compare. I am planting 600 acres to pecans and expect to plant 500 acres more."

The late C. Faulkner, first president of the Texas Nut Growers' association, said: "Many people think the pecan is a difficult tree to grow, but if you take care of it at first, it will later take care of itself. No tree resists drought more than the pecan. Let everyone plant the pecan."

Luther Burbank, the California plant wizard, says: "If I were a young man I would go to Texas, knowing as I do the possibilities of the pecan industry, and devote my life to propagating new species of the pecan as I have done in other horticultural lines here. Your pecan is superior to our walnut. Why not develop it? I can not think of any kind of diversification that will pay the southern farmer as well as pecan growing."

Prof. W. N. Hutt, State Horticulturist, of Raleigh, N. C.: "Prospective planters are often shocked by the high price of pecan trees, which are quoted at 50c to \$2.00 each, as to size. These prices for grafted and budded pecan trees are only commensurate with the high cost of producing them. The high cost of seed, the slowness growth when young, the high cost of scions and buds of them. The small per cent that makes good trees, and the heavy culling necessary, the extra cost of digging the long roots and the careful handling required, all conspire to make these prices legitimate. Again, considering that only 17 to 27 trees are required per acre, and the importance of setting good trees, the price is not excessive."

Prof. John Graig, of Cornell University: A ten year old apple orchard is worth \$1000 per acre, and has to be replanted in from 20 to 40 years; while a pecan grove is planted forever and a day."

Bulletin, Texas Farmers' Congress: "The demand for pecan nuts is far ahead of the supply, and growing rapidly. The whole world is looking to the United States for its supply of pecan nuts. Shall we supply them?"

"Pecan Culture" was the hobby of a few persons a few years ago, and these were considered cranks. Today the man with a pecan grove is the envy of his neighbors, and thousands are striving to get in the class with him. The fact that every grower of pecan nursery stock is planting an orchard of his own is abundant evidence of his own faith in the industry. Land planted to pecans can be farmed for years; or other orchard trees, such as the fig, orange, etc., can be planted between and produce profit bring crops for years. In Georgia is one of the oldest improved orchards in the country, 80 acres in pecans, for which \$80,000 was refused, and in another place an 11 acre grove for which \$25,000 was offered and refused.

The difference between the improved varieties and the native (usually found in the markets) is that the native takes 120 to 200 nuts to make a pound, while the improved varieties are so large that only 25 to 60 are required to make same weight. The improved, besides being larger, are better flavored and the kernels are easily secured whole on account of the soft shell and easy separation.

We have planted out hundreds of improved budded trees and find that the old bugaboo about difficulty of transplanting is a fallacy, for the percentage of loss is almost nothing.

We are prepared to furnish guaranteed trees of selected improved varieties, to prepare the ground for orchard, to plant the trees properly and to care for them as they should be under approved conditions.

Moreover, between these tree rows the first few years can be planted crops if desired. These crops themselves will net you a clear profit. We will gladly give full information to all who are sufficiently interested to write us.
