The committee on Resolutions presented the following report which was adopted:

To the Hon. M. R. Allen, Permanent Chairman Colorado County Democratic Convention.

We, your committee on resolutions respectfully offer the following resolutions for adoption by this convention:

1st. We favor the repeal of the Insurance laws now on our statute books, by which our citizens have been required to pay double insurance.

2nd. We believe that the present Penitentiary laws enforce the payment of unnecessary expense in the operation of our penitentiaries and we recommend such reasonable amendments as will save to the taxpayers such unnecessary burdens, as may be found consistent with the operation and control of the penitentiaries and convicts.

3rd. We recommend such amendments to the Terrell Election Laws as may be found necessary to simplify them to such an extent as that a man of reasonable intelligence may be enabled to know how to cast his vote.

4th. We favor laws regulating the conservation of the flood waters of our rivers for the purpose of creating power to be sold to cities, towns and individuals for manufacturing purposes, and for irrigation.

5th. We favor a daylight closing law, but opposed to any law disfranchising our citizens on account of their occupation, and are opposed to the Quart Law, Ten Mile Law and laws for the sale of liquor in original packages and prohibiting same from being drunk on the premises where sold.

6th. We stand for the time honored principles of Democracy and opposed to the Populist and Socialistic doctrine of the Initiative, Referendum and Recall in the sense in which the same is now construed.

Judge Mansfield offered the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

1st. Resolved that the delegates to the State convention be instructed to use their best efforts to adopt a platform in accordance with the views of Gov. Colquhoun as represented by him in the late campaign which resulted in his magnificent victory before the democratic party of this state.

2nd. Resolved that the action of Hon. Geo. Herder as a member of the last legislature be endorsed and the delegates to the legislative convention be instructed to cast their votes for him for re-election.

There being no further business the convention adjourned.
