The State Truck association at its meeting at A. & M. College last week honored Mr. Fritz Engelhard of this city with reelection as its president. O. G. Kolberg was chosen vice president and Mr. Sheppard of San Marcos is secretary and treasurer.

The association was addressed by Hon. Ed. Kone, Commissioner of Agriculture, Stanley Watson, industrial agent of the Frisco lines, Prof. Kyle of A. & M. College, and other notables and authorities on agricultural matters. One of the most important movements in recent years was brought up before this association, and later was endorsed by the State Horticultural society and the Farmers' Congress. This movement is a new plan for the marketing of perishable crops. It was brought to the attention of the congress in a paper read by Mr. Sprague of San Benito, formerly manager of the California fruit exchange. The idea is simple, being the selection of a general dispatcher whose business it shall be to have constant touch with all markets, and who shall direct fruit or vegetable cars to such markets as are not supplied, thus removing the chief cause for losses, the glutting of any market with more of any crop than it can handle. The plan has been carefully worked out and has the endorsement of leading fruit and truck growers, as well as freight and industrial agents of Texas railroads. The problem of marketing crops is one of the most serious that even old and experienced fruit and truck growers have to contend with, and even the best local organizations often lose many car lots by shipping unknowingly to glutted markets, or to markets that will be glutted

by the time the shipment reaches it. Truck and fruit shipments have been and still are largely a gamble, but under the new plan this will no longer be the case as the knowledge of the markets must be complete each day, and cars will be distributed according to demands of each market. Texas, or even the south half of Texas, can put this plan into successful operation, on account of its crops coming in at favorable seasons, but it is certain that the plan once put in operation will spread to all parts of Texas, and eventually to all the southern fruit and truck growing states.

The passing of the circuit rider is one of the features of the country's development which the old-timers note with some degree of sadness, because he was a figure we all loved and for whose coming we looked with pleasure. The term circuit rider applied only to the traveling preachers of the Methodist Church, but other denominations had their visiting preachers by other names and they all belonged to the same class. In the days when there were but few or no railroads, when the country was thinly populated, these faithful pioneer preachers made their rounds, preaching in various places on their "circuits," preaching the Gospel, ministering to the suffering and doing countless good deeds, usually without pay other than what resulted from collections when the hat was passed, and always cheerfully fulfilling their mission. They were the backbone of the country, the building of railroads and the establishment of many towns in every section, the pastor system has come in and the traveling preacher of the old days is well-nigh a thing of the past. The Dallas Times-Herald pays him this deserved compliment: "The old-fashioned circuit rider was a welcome visitor in hundreds of homes during the early days of Texas. When he visited a family he carried with him a message from our Savior for those souls who need the encouragement that could only be given by an enthusiastic Christian of the circuit rider type. But this traveling preacher did more than read the Bible and preach the Gospel to the little groups of people by the roadside, in the rude homes, or at the little churches. He helped the children with their lessons. He inspired in them ambitions, hope and contentment with their lot. Under the tallow dip this circuit rider sat with the youth of Texas and taught them their arithmetic lessons. Sometimes mounted on a poor horse, sometimes trudging along the highway, this circuit rider represented the true Christian, who performed practical service for his people." —San Antonio Express.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution Authorizing Cities Of More Than 5000 Inhabitants To Adopt Their Charters By Vote Of The People.

(H. J. R. No. 10.) HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION.

House Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section 5, of Article II, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for cities of more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants, to adopt their charter by a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 5 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or if the amendment is rejected by the Legislature of this State, said cities may levy, assess, and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent. of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund of at least two per cent thereon; and provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every two years.

SECTION 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case no general election shall be held in this State for other purposes than this proposed amendment, shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State. At such election those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 5, Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people;" those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 5, Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by the vote of the people." The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much as is necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas out of moneys not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of the publication of this amendment and the proclamation for the election.
