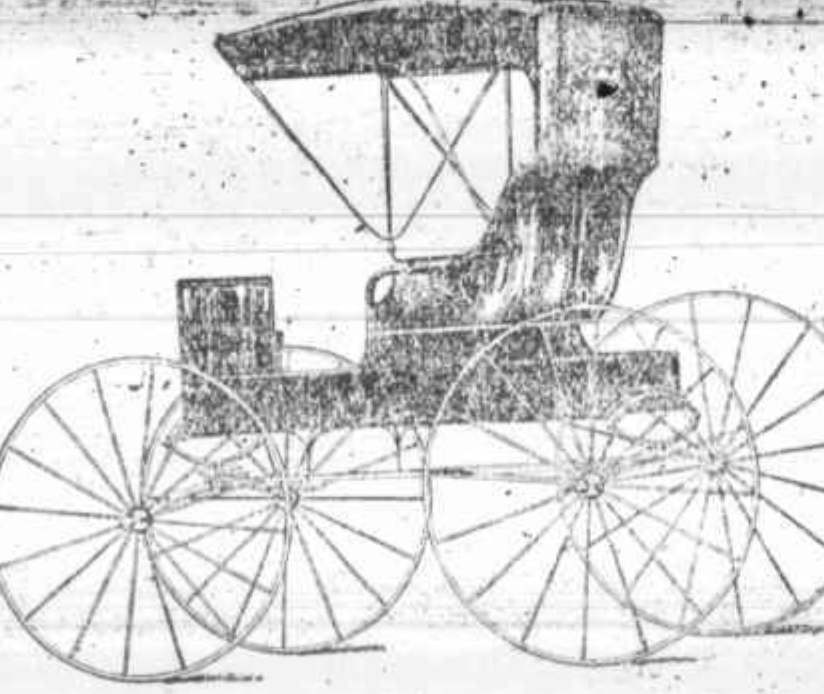

The Tale Bearer.

It is, sometimes very difficult for us to have faith in our friends when we are confronted with something so big, so appalling that it would shake mountains. And yet I think we should, even in the face of the most incriminating evidence, make an effort to believe until we are quite sure the friend has really lost all right to our faith and trust.

Most of us are ready and willing to believe the things that we hear, and most of us are too hasty in our wrath. If we would try to be a little calm, a little cool, I think we would gain so much that we lose in our mad wrath.

There is a case I have in mind of two girls who are, or rather were, most excellent friends—thrown together most intimately for nearly a year, drawn together by the trouble and sorrow of a mutual friend. There was no reason in the whole wide world for these two to dislike each other, and there was every reason for them to like each other.

Another friend of one of the girls made trouble. Her motive no one has ever been able to understand or grasp. Jealousy seems the only reasonable motive, and yet that scarcely seems likely—sometimes I feel it was simply a little bit of meddling, meddling in her make-up which had to be indulged.

At any rate, she said things to her friend's friend that had no foundation of fact, not the slightest, and resulted in the most awful hurt to both, and the shattering of a very sweet and pleasant friendship. The girl accused was given no opportunity to "plead her cause."

The word of the tale-bearer, who was prejudiced in every way, weighed against a year of friendship and intimate acquaintance.

It seems to me that the girl who listened to the tales might have had a little of the faith and trust that seems to me to be a part of friendship. She might have reasoned out that this meddling friend could have only one object, that of making trouble. The meddling friend did not like the mutual friendship of these two girls and she resented any one's liking the younger girl, so she went systematically to work to break up their intimacy. She was successful—at least, we will say that she is temporarily successful, for all things of that sort are righted in time, and justice does finally prevail, though sometimes it seems mighty long in the coming.

It has taught one girl a sad but valuable lesson, and that is to give no credence to the tale-bearers ever. It has taught her to cultivate a little more strenuously the virtue of faith and belief in her friends.

How much happier a great many of us would be if we could learn to be a little less ready to believe the unkind, the unjust and the untrue things that come to us. The person who tells us things that will hurt is never a friend—I mean the person who tells us unkind things that are said about us. Personally I have no respect for a woman who does such a thing. There are circumstances where such an act is kindness, but it is always easy to distinguish between the tales that are told us in kindness and the tales that are told to make trouble.

Faith, faith, faith. That is what we want! A great deal of faith and a keener sense of fairness and justice, and there will be fewer tale-bearers.
