Notice of Election

The State of Texas,
 County of Colorado,
 On this the 19th day of August A. D. 1912, this court being in special session, came on to be considered the petition of Victor Engelhard and one hundred and two (102) other persons, praying that bonds be issued by that political subdivision of Colorado county, Texas, known and defined as justice's precinct No. Eight, of Colorado county, Texas, which said justice's precinct No. Eight for the purpose of operating and being known under the provisions of the Road District Act passed by the First Called Session of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Texas, and for the employment of said Act, has been by order duly entered upon the minutes of said court established, described and defined as Road District No. One, of Colorado county, Texas, in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum and maturing forty years from the date thereof, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled and paved roads and turnpikes, and in aid thereof, in said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, is more particularly described by metes and bounds as follows: Beginning on the East bank of the Colorado river at the North West corner of the G. S. Snider League, being the South West corner of Justice Precinct No. 7; thence down the Colorado river with its meanderings to the Wharton County line; thence North-easterly with the line between Wharton and Colorado Counties to the San Bernardo river, being the Austin County line; thence up the San Bernardo river with its meanderings to the South East corner of the H. & T. C. R. R. Co. Survey No. 3, being the South East corner of Justice Precinct No. 6; thence West with the South line of said Justice Precinct No. 6, to the corner of Justice Precinct No. 7; being the east corner of the R. Alley League; thence Southwesterly with the line of said Justice Precinct No. 7 to the place of beginning, on the North West corner of the G. S. Snider League.

And it appearing to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Road District No. One, of Colorado county, Texas, and that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas.

It is therefore considered and ordered by the court, that an election be held in said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, on Tuesday, the 24th day of September, A. D. 1912, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, shall be issued in the amount one hundred thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, and maturing forty years from the date thereof; for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled and paved roads and turnpikes, and in aid thereof in said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said Road District No. One, of Colorado county, Texas, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published in said Road District No. One, of Colorado county, Texas, for four successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in said Road District No. One, of Colorado county, Texas, for three weeks prior to said election. Said election shall be held at the usual voting place for holding general elections in said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, to-wit: At the usual voting place in the city of Eagle Lake, and of which election W. Y. Westmoreland, is Judge, and W. M. Williamson is assistant Judge, and James Carney, and T. L. Long, judges of the court, to hold said election and make return thereof as required by law.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the road district act passed at the first called session of the Thirty-First Legislature of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the Issuance of Bonds and Levying of the Tax in Payment therefor," and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Issuance of Bonds and Levying of the Taxes in Payment therefor."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing general elections.

A copy of this order signed by the county judge of said county, shall serve as a proper notice of said election; and the county judge is directed to cause said notice to be published in a newspaper published in said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, for four successive weeks next preceding said election, and caused to be posted notices thereof at three public places in said Road District No. One of Colorado county, Texas, for three weeks prior to said election.
