The fig preserving plant operated by Koberg & Anderson, at the Eagle Lake Nurseries, has been running to its fullest capacity during the past two weeks, and it is expected will continue the canning of figs for several weeks. The quality of the preserves put up at this plant is unsurpassed by any other in the south, last season winning the honors at the Dallas and San Antonio fairs. The preserves attracted special attention at the latter fair, resulting in a request that they be placed in the Texas exhibit at the Southern Industrial building at Washington, D. C., where they may be seen during the present year. The output of this plant is considered far superior to that of last year, and the demand for the product is far beyond any possibility of supplying; one firm alone having made a bid for the entire output at a figure above the ruling wholesale price. Next year it is expected that the fig crop will exceed this year's by many tons, and plans are being perfected to increase the capacity of the plant by a complete new steam outfit with latest devices for this industry. It is also planned to add to this an equipment for canning tomatoes, sweet potatoes, etc. That the canning and preserving plant is destined to become one of the important industries of Eagle Lake is the prediction of business men who have examined into its prospects.
