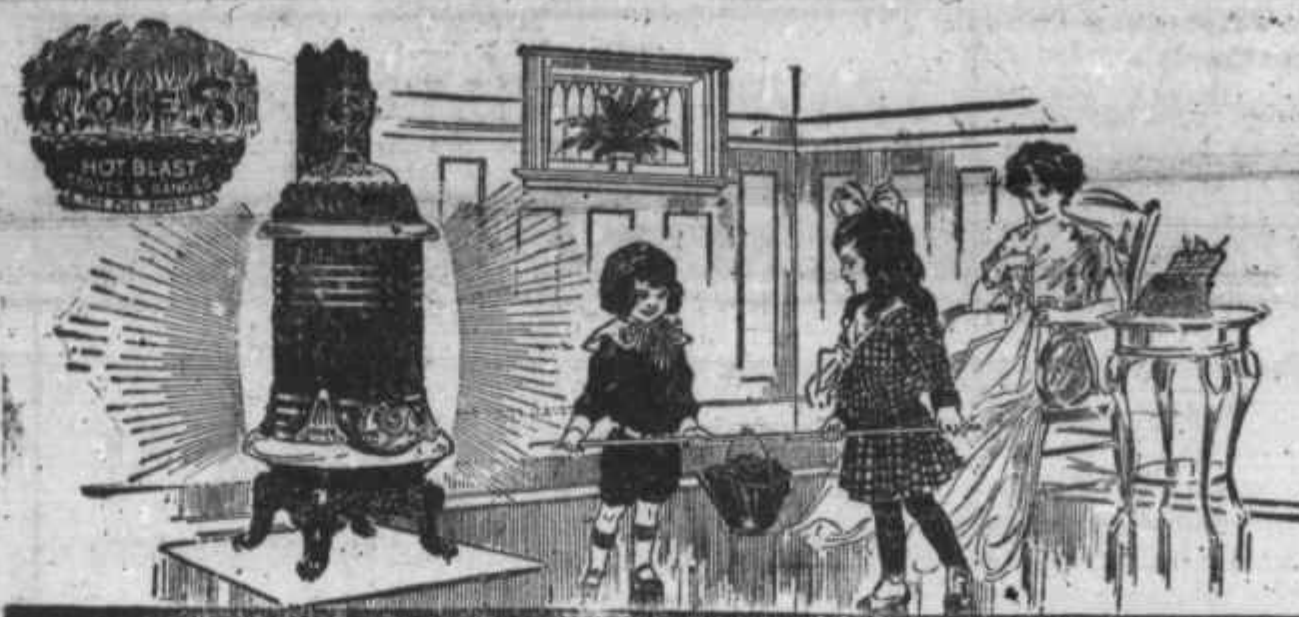
Bonus Camp Physician
