KILLED SATURDAY NIGHT

McCulloch Jackson Killed And Will Shropshire Arrested.

As a result of a fracas between Will Shropshire and McCulloch Jackson, both negroes, at the Crockett dance hall, in the negro section of town last Saturday night about 12 o'clock, Jackson was killed by Sunday evening and Shropshire has been arrested on a charge of murder, a knife being the weapon used. McCulloch Jackson had been behind the bar, the young negro striking the skull. After being struck with the knife Jackson ran about half a block and fell. He was brought to Dr. Fitzgerald's office for treatment and died in the doctor's office a few minutes after being taken there. Shropshire was arrested and locked up in the calaboose. An inquest was held by Judge Davidson Sunday morning and the defendant was allowed bond in the sum of \$500 to appear on next regular justice court day at which time a preliminary trial will be given. Will Shropshire is a one legged negro and is employed as delivery driver for the Farmer's Supply Company. He is about twenty-eight years old and has always sustained a good reputation. McCulloch Jackson was about nineteen years of age, and worked as a driver on one of Mr. Walker's "sawmill wagons."

Mr. Hugh Brummett, a former Flatonia boy, was quite badly injured about four o'clock Wednesday afternoon by falling from an electric light pole. He was working on a pole near Mr. Keith's home when the pole fell, striking on a picket fence. His ear was horribly cut and torn by one of the sharp pickets. Dr. Cross dressed the wounds and the injured member is healing as rapidly as could be expected.

ARE MEETING IN WEIMAR

Colorado Baptist Association Is Holding Session at Weimar.

Weimar is this week crowded with delegates in attendance at the Colorado Baptist Association. Tuesday night the opening sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Israel of Victoria. Wednesday the members were in an all day business session. The lady members met at the Methodist church with the opening address by the president, Mrs. Stoker of Houston. The president, Mrs. W. S. Shaves, Wednesday night Rev. Mr. Mayfield of Wharton preached; and Thursday night Rev. Mr. Wolfe of Palacios. Sunday Rev. Mr. Stack of Waco will preach the dedication sermon.

Catholic Church Notes.

Father Montrail, the Catholic Missionary from Bay City visited Eagle Lake Wednesday to see the people here in regard to raising funds for the new Catholic church to be erected in this city. He called at this office and had with him the plans for the new building, which will be a very pretty one. These plans were sent him by friends in the North. He advises that all the people that are interested to deposit their offering for the building fund in either of the Eagle Lake banks. He says that a very strict account will be kept and presented to the public of all receipts, and expenses. He says he does not want to collect any money himself, but he will obtain from outside one-third of the amount needed to pay for the work on the building. He says he objects to putting his congregation in debt. He says: "Please be kind enough to solicit funds and deposit them in the name of the Catholic church of Eagle Lake in either of the local banks." He stated that the specifications will be drawn by a business man in Eagle Lake and when everything is ready he will go to Galveston to present plans and specifications to the Bishop of this diocese. He said further: "In order that the people may fully understand the situation, the Priest invites the public to give their opinion to him verbally or in writing, addressing all communications to Bay City." He says all lumber concerns and contractors of Eagle Lake will be kept informed of everything in which they may be interested. He stated that a committee of five will be appointed to assist the Priest in making contracts. A printed list of all amounts and receipts, he says, will be published in later issues. He says he wants to build according to the means of Eagle Lake, and asks that you be kind enough to encourage the good work and bring in line the two hundred Catholics surrounding Eagle Lake.
