Gentlemen:
In reply to your enquiry of Sept. 30th will say that I have been using a Universal Gas Tractor since the 1st of last December. I plowed with the engine all winter and after the plowing was done disced all my land from two to six times. After finishing my rice crop I hauled a 200 acre crop of potatoes to the station, about two miles, and then rented the engine to a friend who has a road contract to pull. I believe an Austin Grader, any way it is a big one, having a 12 foot blade.

I don't see but that the engine part is as good as ever. I have recently replaced one bull pinion and will soon have to replace the other, and aside from the axle points and hubs on the front wheels it doesn't seem to show any wear.

I neglected to say the engine is still pulling the above mentioned grader.

On my rice farm I had 13 head of work stock and this engine. We started the mule plows and the engine plow at the same time.

When we finished plowing and took stock of the results, we found that we had plowed 150 acres of the lightest land with the mules, and 400 acres with the engine. As I stated above I did all the disking with the engine, going over most of it double time and some three times. I ran one mule disc to work out corner, etc. Pulled the drills with the mules.

After I was finished planting rice, I found that the feed bill on the rice land was \$850.00 and the

fuel bill for the engine was \$150.00.

Will say this much in favor of the mules however, that while we were plowing the rice land, that a good part of the time the ground was in such a sticky state that the mule plows would not take it, while the engine plow was heavy enough to go in and turn in over, consequently the mules were standing up most of the time waiting for the land to either get wetter or dryer and the engine was turning the ground over regardless.
