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Something About Egyptian Wheat

The following article concerning the growth and culture of Egyptian wheat, is taken from the Angleton Times. Considerable amount of this wheat is being successfully grown around Bay City, and if it will apply the farmers of the prairie around Eagle Lake with feed stuff, the article is certainly worth your careful consideration and investigation.

"To many people this is a new thing and for the benefit of such we will try to tell you something about it. Egyptian wheat is a nonsaccharine sorghum, resembling in growth the regular sorghum except in the shape of the head, which is much larger, and sprang in form, seed is somewhat smaller than that of Kafir corn, and of a cream color. It is thought by some to be the

corn of Egypt that the seeds of Jacob were sent down to buy, however this may be, we know that it is good and yields well and will grow on most any kind of soil. It stands dry weather remarkably well and also wet weather. It can be planted any time after the weather is warm enough to germinate the seed. (It takes hot sunny weather for germination, you will get the best results by planting in rows about 3 feet apart and about 12 inches apart in row and as near as possible, not more than two or three seeds in a place, as it is great for stalling out especially on good strong land. On good land it will grow to be eight or ten feet high. Just how valuable the fodder is for feed we have not yet determined, but we believe that for mules and horses it will prove fairly good. Be that as it may, certain it is that the seed does make a number one feed for all kinds of stock and for poultry it has no equal. For cattle and other stock it should be ground to get the best results. How about the yield? Well, we planted 24 acres this year on sandy land and it has been a dry season, nor did it get much cultivation, and we feel safe to say that it will make 50 bushels per acre, and if planted in good season, it will make two tops from the one seeding, though the second one, perhaps, would not give so much seed as the first. The proof of the pudding is the eating." Next year we intend planting more of it, as it, promises to be the solution of the high price feed question. Just how far north this plant would succeed, we do not know, but here in South Texas it is a wonder.

A gentleman near Angleton, who has 40 acres this year, we understand estimates that he will have 2,500 bushels of seed. This would be little over 62 bushels per acre, and we have heard of yields as high as 80 to 100 bushels per acre further south. Try it. It is well worth the effort; once planted, always planted.
