Judge Kennon's Charge.

The following is a portion of Judge Kennon's charge to the grand jury in the district court at Hallettsville Monday, same being reprinted from the Hallettsville New Era:

The judge made a rather lengthy charge this time, laying special stress on the evil of carrying concealed weapons. He said that there was no greater cause for homicide than this and that he favored a law that allowed every man to carry a pistol if he wanted to but that he would have to carry it in plain sight, that if he wore an overcoat or slicker he would have to carry it on the outside just the same; and that if he did carry the weapon concealed it was to be a penitentiary offense. He said that the evil was great in some localities, especially in his home town, Columbus, and ventured the assertion that if any ten men in that city were arrested on the streets indiscriminately it would be found that five of them were carrying weapons.

The result being seen in the repeated killings there.

No legal provision has been made in any of the states for the innocent person who is convicted and lodged in the penitentiary. Recently in Pennsylvania a dying man confessed that he was the murderer of a man for whose murder another man had been in the penitentiary twenty years. The matter was taken up, the innocent man was released, but he left the prison walls with nothing save a new suit of clothes and a five dollar bill as compensation for his twenty years of toil and his ruined life. The wronged man has no redress for the mistake of the state. He cannot recover damages for the injustice done him for his years of toil. Wife and children had left him, friends had deserted, and all hopes of winning fortune or name had flown, and yet all that is left the poor fellow is to suffer in silence the wrongs inflicted by a state he had served by a government pledged to his protection. A few such cases have been reported in Texas and others will come on later, for the wheels of justice occasionally slip a cog. We sincerely hope another session of the Texas Legislature will not pass without provision having been made for such unfortunate.—Honey Grove Signal.
