BUILDING CONTINUES IN EAGLE LAKE

Growth Started Immediately After
1900 Storm Has Never
Subsided.

Building and improving is go-
ing on in every section of the
town and all the carpenters and
painters in the city are kept
busy. There seems to be no let
up to Eagle Lake's building spell.
It is not a building boom, but a
gradual building growth and
improvement which began right
after the great storm of 1900, and
has never subsided. That storm

construction right now, and one

fidence the people have in the
future prosperity of this section,
is nearly all of these fine homes
are being erected by people who
have lived here a long time and
know best the splendid resources
of this great country and see the
wonderful future that is before
the Eagle Lake section—the best
section of country in Texas.

FALLS FROM A MOVING TRAIN

W. C. Bell of Galveston Fell From
Sap's Davy Crockett Train
Saturday Night.

Mr. W. C. Bell, an insurance
man and advertising novelty
salesman, whose home is in Gal-
veston, fell from the Sap Davy
Crockett train near the rice mill
last Saturday night, breaking his
left arm and sustaining numer-
ous other bruises. Mr. Bell was
in the smoker when the train
whirled at the Santa Fe crossing
and started into the next car to
get his grips, and in passing be-
tween the cars fell through the
open vestibule from the platform.
He was taken to one of the near-
by residences some minutes af-
ter the accident by a freight crew,
and Dr. Fitzgerald was telephon-
ed for. The doctor conveyed the
injured man in his auto to the
Fitzgerald sanitarium where his
arm was set and his other injur-
ies treated. Mr. Bell remained
at the sanitarium until Tuesday
when he left for Galveston.

There were over four hundred
acres of long staple cotton in Co-
lorado county this season planted

long staple seed. The yield was
close to a bale per acre and the
average price was around 17c
per pound. The people of this

age of long staple are so well

staple acreage in the Eagle Lake

the colored people of this section.

on Main Street for Mrs. Wm.
Franz. These new buildings
will add greatly to that portion
of the business section of the
town.
This paper learns that Mr. A.
C. McClanahan of the McClana-
han Lumber Company, is arrang-
ing to build a fine new home in
the near future. The new Mc-
Clanahan home, so we are told,
will be the finest in Colorado
county, costing about \$15,000.

DEATH OF JAMES WILLIAM WAGNER

Little Four Year Old Son of Mr.
and Mrs. A. L. Wagner
Died Monday.

The HEADLIGHT's deepest sym-
pathy is extended Mr. and Mrs.
A. L. Wagner in the death of
their little four year old son,
James William, which sad event
occurred at their home in this
city Monday morning, the fune-
ral being held with interment in
the Masonic cemetery the same
afternoon. The little fellow was
a beautiful child, bright and in-
teresting and idolized by his
mother and father, and a general
favorite with all who knew him.
A week before his death the child
was taken violently ill from eat-
ing canned goods, and later de-
veloped blood poisoning in the
throat. The heart broken moth-
er and father have the sympathy
of the entire town in the loss of
their darling little boy.

Santa Fe Conductor Killed.

Bellville, Tex., Oct. 20.—A. O.
Blucher, a freight conductor on
the south end, was instantly kill-
ed at the Bellville yards this
morning about 2 o'clock by fall-
ing between two moving cars
while walking over the top of the
train from the caboose as his
train moved into the yards.
He was literally ground to
pieces and his remains had to be
gathered up in a blanket. A
brakeman saw him stumble and
fall between the cars. The brake-
man was so shocked that he
threw away his lantern and quit
his job.

The dead man had worked here
for three or four years for the
Santa Fe and was well known in
railroad circles. He was unmar-
ried so far as can be learned.
He was reared at Flatonia, and
had a sister living there and an
other living at Burton. It was
some time before either of them
could be found by wire. The
sister at Burton hurried on to
Bellville this afternoon at 5
o'clock and had her brother's re-
mains shipped to Flatonia for
burial.

Mr. Blucher was well known
to many people in Eagle Lake,
having often been stationed here
in charge of a train during the
fall months.

Alex Hill, colored, a resident
of Eagle Lake for twenty years,
died at his home in this city
Saturday night. Alex was well
known and liked by all the white
people and was very popular and
prominent among the colored
people. He was a very large man,
weighing possibly three hun-
dred pounds and was fifty-nine
years of age. Alex was a good
negro, and his death is deeply
mourned by the people of his
race. His funeral was one of
the largest colored funerals ever
held in Eagle Lake.

Dr. D. T. Stanley, late of St.
Louis, who is now conducting
the revival at the Christian
church, has been called by that
congregation as pastor for half
his time. The church is to be
congratulated on securing such
a fine preacher. Dr. Stanley's
wife will join him here from St.
Louis shortly.
