The Lemon as a Medicine

The average headache may frequently be cured by several slices of lemon in a cup of strong tea, and a bilious headache is almost invariably put to rout by a tablespoonful of lemon juice in a small cup of black coffee. The juice of half a lemon in a cup of hot water first thing in the morning is an excellent liver corrective and a successful substitute for calomel and similar drugs.

Honey, alum and lemon juice is an old-fashioned but good remedy for croup. A dash of lemon juice in water makes a pleasant and effective tooth wash, cleaning the teeth and sweetening the breath. In fact, a lemon is pretty much of a concentrated drug store. Outwardly applied lemon juice and rosewater will remove tan and whiten the skin, and taken inwardly, lemon juice on lump sugar is fine for hoarseness.

far superior as a salad dressing to vinegar and a teaspoonful of lemon juice adds a dainty flavor and whitens the grains of boiling rice or sago. Salt and lemon juice remove rust stains from white goods, and tough meat may be made tender by adding a teaspoonful of lemon juice to the water in which it is to be boiled. If the hands become stained, lemon juice will make them white.

The lemon does not end its useful career even when the juice and pulp have been extracted. The half skins make dainty and attractive receptacles for serving ice or salads, or dipped in salt, the rinds clean brass thoroughly and quickly.

Household Notes

If your suede shoes become shiny rub them with fine sand paper.

Put sliced orange in your tomato preserves; it will improve the flavor.

Good bacon is known by its thin rind and firm fat of a pink-white.

Do not neglect to wash house plants in soapsuds; it will destroy insects.

All cooked food should be thoroughly cooled before being placed in the ice box.

One level teaspoon of salt will season one quart of soup, sauce or vegetables.

If new shoes squeak, run linseed oil into the soles; it will stop the squeaking.

One cup of sugar will sweeten one quart of any mixture to be served chilled or frozen.

When no eggs are used, allow two level teaspoons of baking powder to each cup of flour.

The skin of poultry is frequently dirty, and before preparing it for cooking, should be scrubbed with a soft brush and warm water in which a teaspoonful of baking soda has been dissolved.

If the skin of new potatoes has a slightly green coloring they have been sunburned and the flavor will not be good, nor will they cook to be mealy and fluffy.

Laces which have become stained with perspiration can be successfully washed in cold water and soap, and after the stains are removed put them into warm water.

A very delicious salad is made of apples and oranges. Cut in small pieces one apple, two oranges, lettuce, ground nuts; serve on lettuce leaves with salad dressing.
