The Election in Eagle Lake.

There was a light vote polled
at the Eagle Lake box on last
Tuesday's election, only 212 vot-
es, which resulted for presiden-
tial electors as follows:

Democratic party 152; Repub-
lican party 16; Progressive party
23; Prohibition party 1; Soci-
alist party 4; Socialist Labor party
1.

All of the four amendments
carried at this box. T. W. Davis
was elected public weigher over
Mr. Wilson by a majority of four
votes. These two candidates tied
in the democratic primary for
the nomination, each getting 51
votes. Neither name was printed
on the ballot and therefore
had to be written with pencil by
the voters. Their names were
also not printed on the demo-
cratic primary ballots although
Mr. Davis claims to have sent in
the amount required to have it
done and that he holds receipt
for same. Their names being
printed on neither ticket, this
race was overlooked by many vot-
ers at both elections. Harvey
Vineyard received 1 vote for sher-
iff, and J. E. Davidson 1 vote for
justice of the peace.

a load of watermelons from his
