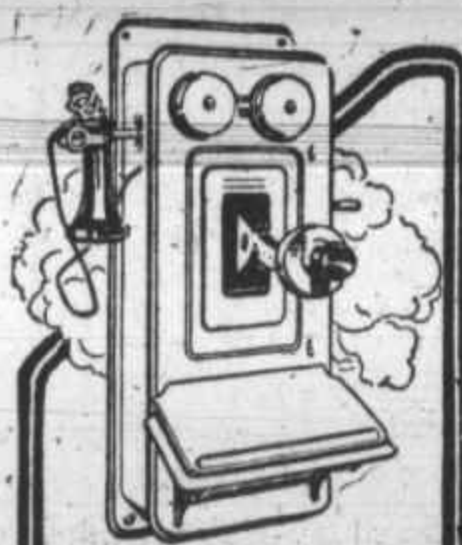

Colorado County Exhibit at Dallas Fair.

From the Dallas News:

Exhibitors in charge of the county displays are pleased with the attention their booths are attracting from fair visitors. This is especially true because so many of those who are daily inspecting the displays are showing an intelligent interest and are seeking information with a view to future investment. On this basis, exhibitors proclaim this fair the most successful in history, and plans are already

under way by several county representatives to make a greater effort next year to excel in this department.

Colorado County carried off the blue ribbon on its combined display of rice, sugar made from sugar cane, syrup, etc., also blue ribbon on preserved figs and wine. While other premiums were also secured, M. C. Yates, in charge of the exhibit, apparently takes the greater pride in displaying these mentioned. Mr. Yates shows a pardonable pride in the progress being made in his county along agricultural and horticultural lines. In discussing his county he not only points to the exhibit, hurriedly gotten together, but hands out a line of production statistics which are almost startling, especially when one considers the fact that it was only comparatively a few years ago that Colorado County was a backwater, producing nothing but cattle.

Yesterday Mr. Yates talked to many visitors and to each he gave a little folder, on which was printed the following:

Irish potatoes, spring crop..... \$800,000
Cotton..... 600,000
Rice..... 1,000,000
Sugar..... 1,000,000
Corn..... 250,000

Total crop value 1912, \$3,650,000
"Add to this the value of fruit, truck, cattle and hogs and other crops and you will not wonder why we are contented in Colorado County."

Mr. Yates calls special attention to the opportunities in grape growing in his county, and cites the visitor to the success of Capt. Siegfried Böck, who with a vineyard of thirty-six acres containing 28,000 vines is clearing about \$5,000 to \$6,000 per year by mak-

ing and marketing wine, samples of which are now decorated with the State Fair blue ribbon. He also calls attention to opportunities in growing figs, citing the success of Kolberg & Anderson, two young men who have gone into the industry on a large scale, and are now caring for ninety acres, from which they are reaping a harvest by operating their own preserving plant. Other opportunities for which Colorado County is becoming noted, and for which records are available, are among the topics of conversation in the Colorado County booth, where Mr. Yates holds forth every hour of the day, keeping his section of Texas before the thousands of fair visitors.
