Doings of the City Council.

The petition of E. A. Toliver
asking for permit to repair the
ten shop and cover the front of
the building with galvanized iron
was granted.

Motion was made and carried
that the analysis of the State
Chemist on the city water be
turned over to the Mayor and
that he be instructed to pub-
lish the same in the Eagle Lake
HEADLIGHT, and that the Water
& Light Company be asked to
pay for so doing.

The street committee was or-
dered to have the public water
trough repaired or make other
arrangements as the committee
sees fit.

A motion was made and carried
that the Mayor instruct J. J.
Whaley to furnish abstract and
field notes for the land bargained
for by the city.

A motion was carried that an
ordinance be drafted creating a
fund for live stock in order to
more rigidly enforce the stock
law.

Alderman Lenhart was appoint-
ed to make inquiry into the ser-
vice of the Water & Light Com-
pany, and to report any com-
plaint to the board and to deduct
from statements in case the ser-
vice is not satisfactory.

Permit was granted S. P. Da-
mon to erect a one story brick
building, 30x80 feet, on Main
Street, next to the Farmer's Sup-
ply Company's store and to move
small building now occupied by
J. W. Schneider to lot facing
Jones Avenue.

Motion was made that certain
streets be designated through
which live stock may be driven.
This motion was tabled until the
council's next meeting.
