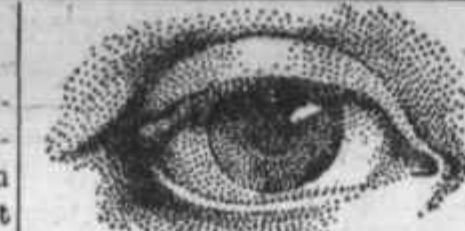
Mr. and Mrs. Comley left on the 11:15 train for San Antonio, where they will be at home after Nov. 10 at 424 Devine St.

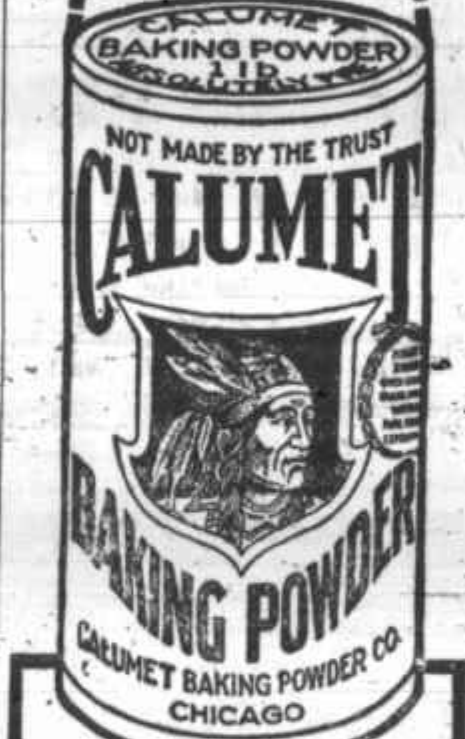
