Demonstration Jottings. It's the early plover that gathers the best crops. As your seed bed is so shall your crop be: Poor seed bed, poor crop; good seed bed, good crop. What you sow, that shall you also reap: Poor seed, starvation harvest; good seed, comfort and plenty. Scrub seed means scrub crop. Get out of the scrub class if you haven't already done so. Get busy and look for better seeds right now. Time is getting short for putting in your cover crop; do it now. A good cover crop means dollars worth of increased fertility next year. You can't afford to neglect it.

There never was a more favorable time for exploring that new farm and getting it ready for next year's crop—we mean the farm that lies immediately under the one you have been working and overworking so long. Right under each acre that you have been farming you will find new land that will make a virgin soil, rich and productive, if you will put your plow down and turn it up this fall to let the air, sunshine and moisture, Nature's alchemists, work their wonders and create new plant food. Lend Mother Nature a hand in this work by stirring with disc and section harrow several times between plowing and planting, and you will find that in seasons of drought your crops will thrive when others fail. If you don't believe it try it on a ten acre test plot and prove it to your own satisfaction.

As soon as the last row of cotton is picked start the stalk cutter or disc harrow to chop the stalks. Follow with a plow that will put it all under. Unless your cotton field is seriously infested with weevils, don't burn the stalks—it's like burning money. Your corn field likewise. The soil must have a reasonable amount of vegetable matter, humus, to keep it from packing, "cupping together," and to store moisture against the summer's

drought. If you can, add to this by a cover crop of oats, rye, emmer, vetch or clover, and turn the winter's growth under in the spring. Work the stalks, grasses and manure into the soil. It's putting money in the bank to your account.

Get in touch with your county demonstration agent. Consult with national and state agricultural departments through him. Let him get you authoritative information, proved and tested, on subjects in which you are interested relating to farming. Like the successful manufacturer, the farmer who wishes to succeed must keep advised of the latest and best information relating to his business.
